


The RHS Hall of Fame Committee reserves the right to change or modify the criteria for induction into the Ridgewood High School Hall of Fame and it openly welcomes nominations and information supporting nomination of candidates for induction from all potential sources.

The Ridgewood Athletic Hall of Fame is affiliated with the Ridgewood Public Schools and acts as a representative body of Ridgewood High School as designated by the Ridgewood Board of Education. #### MIKE MULLIN, BOYS AND GIRLS INDOOR TRACK 1996-2012

Coach Mike Mullin lead both the boys and girls programs in track and field for seventeen seasons. In that time, his boys teams accumulated 11 league, 2 county and 2 state sectional championships. His girls teams also brought home 11 league titles, while taking 8 county championships and 3 state sectional titles.



#### CRAIG MAHLER, BOYS SOCCER 1998-2012

Coach Craig Mahler lead the boys soccer program at RHS for sixteen seasons. In that time his teams accumulated a record of 161-115-19. The Maroons under his guidance were always a very competitive team winning an outright NNJIL title in 2001 and earned a berth in the prestigious Bergen County tournament final in 2002.



#### JIM STROKER, BOYS BASKETBALL 1987-2005

Coach Jim Stroker lead the boys basketball program at RHS for eighteen seasons. The program under Coach Stroker developed a reputation for tough defense and a strong spirit that always allowed them to be competitive no matter who the opposition might be. His RHS teams accumulated 207 wins, which is the most wins by any RHS basketball coach to date. His teams gained league titles in the tough NNJIL in 2001 and 2005 as well as the school's first state sectional title in 35 years winning that title in 2005 before progressing to the state group 4 final. A final appearance in the 1994 Bergen jamboree final also brought acclaim to the Maroons. Coach Stroker is a member of the New Jersey Scholastic Coaches Hall of Fame.



#### KEITH COOK, BOYS AND GIRLS SWIMMING 2001-2013, 2014-2015


As head coach of the boys and girls swimming programs for fourteen seasons at RHS, Keith Cook brought both programs into prominence at the county and state level. His boys program accumulated a dual meet record of 117-46, with 3 league titles, 2 Bergen County titles and 3 state sectional championships. His girls program accumulated a dual meet record of 107-60 with 2 league titles and 3 state sectional titles. Coach Cook now serves as the Athletic Director at Ridgewood High School.



#### JACOB BROWN, GIRLS CROSS COUNTRY 1974-2014, GIRLS TRACK & FIELD 1972-2015

One of the most respected high school Cross Country and Track and Field coaches in the country, Coach Jacob Brown's teams and coaching career are legendary. THE RECORD'S All 20th Century Coach for both sports accumulated a combined total of 739 dual meet wins (379 CC and 360 T&F) against 52 losses and 3 ties! Along with the dual meet victories, his teams brought home 240 "Championship Meet" victories as well as countless league, county and state sectional and state group championships. Also named the NSAF National Track and Field Coach of the year in 2010, Coach Brown has also been inducted into the New Jersey Scholastic Coaches Association Hall of Fame as well as the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

## MAUREEN GRIECO Administrative Assistant to the Athletic Director 1989-2014

In his article for "The Record" on January 6, 2015 announcing Maureen Grieco's retirement from her position in the athletic department at Ridgewood High School, sports writer Darren Cooper wrote "Maureen Grieco never won a championship for Ridgewood. She didn't coach. She didn't play sports. And the school probably won't put her name in the gym now that she is retired.


But after twenty five and a half years as the schools administrative assistant to the athletic director, ner contributions were undeniable." All true statements, but we now honor Maureen's outstanding accomplishments for RHS athletics by putting her name up along the main gymnasium wall with all the other inductees to the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame making her one of the all time Maroon and White greats.

Working for six athletic directors for close to twenty six years (Dave Vanderbush, Garland Allen, Walt Hampson, Tom Zaccone, Greg McDonald and Nick Scerbo) Maureen was adaptable to the many differences each brought to the job. Each of these men knew they had an indispensable resource with Maureen that allowed for them to function in as sane a manner that a person in that position could possibly expect. She was able to handle each change professionally and skillfully mentored each new AD into a comfort zone after the initial shock of a huge learning curve.

Maureen's responsibilities included scheduling games, officials and transportation. She also confirmed previously made schedules and notified all parties of changes in a timely manner. This included rescheduling of transportation, officials and facilities. She was responsible for disseminating information to and communicating with 25 head coaches, 35 assistant coaches for 27 sports and 75 teams. All the while she kept a smile and treated everyone with dignity and often times grace under fire! Further, in her job description it is noted she provided administrative support for each sport including ordering equipment, athletic physicals, parental permission slips, eligibility records, athletic letters, preparation for awards dinners and typing recommendations for student athletes presented to her by her coaches. Her position also required regular communication with other districts AD's and Athletic Administrators, parent booster groups, the press and general public. She needed knowledge of the NJSIAA regulations especially in the area of eligibility and transfers and the completion and filing of regular NJSIAA reports. Most importantly her job required that she make immediate decisions in regard to the daily functioning of the athletic department in the absence of the athletic director. Maureen was professional and knew the impact her decisions would have on everyone concerned with athletics on a daily basis. She would never make unilateral decisions and always trusted her coaches to lend a helping hand.

Each year the job grew. There were new computer programs, with several software systems, night games, freshman and JV tournaments, new field scheduling practices, extended work schedules and working gates at games. Each time the job changed, like a great athlete or coach Maureen was able to adapt her game to the circumstance. Eventually along with Nick Scerbo she also absorbed the duties of the secretary to the Wellness dept. and like every great athlete, Maureen knew when it was time to step away from the game. An all time great we salute Maureen's invaluable contributions to RHS athletics for 25 1/2 years with her induction into the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

#### TOSHIKO d'ELIA

#### Special Contributor (Runner, Survivor and Inspiration to All)

Toshiko Kishimoto d'Elia grew up amid the chaos and ravages of post-war Japan and went on to become a pioneer in women's running; setting numerous American and World records at every age division and distance. In that journey she touched everyone she met.

Toshi was born in 1930 in Kyoto, into one of Japan's most powerful families, who started the steel industry in Japan. Coming from wealth in no way deterred her fierce desire to succeed on her own. "After the war, we all starved" she said. "Toshiko would stand on food lines all day and bring home a cucumber to feed a family of six. She said, "I dreamed of being a bird so I could fly away."

Away she flew! Against her father's wishes, who claimed he would rather spend money on a new horse than educating a woman, she came to the United States in 1951 accepting a Fulbright Scholarship to study audiology. She went on to teach deaf children at New York School for the Deaf in White Plains, NY for 37 years. In 1960 She married Manfred d'Elia, and with her daughter, Erica, started a long and fulfilling life in the village of Ridgewood, NJ.

The d'Elia family were avid outdoors people and accomplished climbers and hikers. On one climb up Mt Rainier, Toshiko was told by the guide that she wasn't allowed to summit because of her lack of conditioning, and was ordered to descend. The news, while devastating at the time, was yet another door Toshi flew through to discover a new passion...running. When she returned home from Mt Ranier so dejected, her daughter, Erica, suggested she try jogging to give her a base of fitness. Before long, 1 mile turned into 3, which then turned into 5 and more a day. Erica tricked her mom into her 1st race pleading with her to enter so that her good friend wouldn't finish last. "Just follow us...you'll be fine!" Erica won the race, her friend finished 2nd and everyone was shocked to see that Toshi did indeed follow them and finished 3rd, beating hundreds of high school and college female runners. Now she was hooked.

Toshi went on to train seriously and exploded onto the running scene. She qualified for the prestigious Boston Marathon "by accident" accompanying a friend as a training run and deciding halfway to go ahead and finish. She ran her first Boston marathon in 3:15 and followed up that Fall being the 3<sup>rd</sup> overall woman finisher in New York City Marathon in 3:08. When race director Fred Lebow announced her age of 47 years old, the crowd roared and a masters star was born. In 1980 d'Elia went on to become the first woman over 50 years to break 3 hours in the marathon in Glasgow Scotland with a time of 2:57:25. She was named Runner of the Year by Runner's World Magazine and honored with the Paavo Nurmi Award. The NY Road Runners Club honored Toshi as the coveted Runner of the Year 27 out of 30 years from the 1970-90's. She was also the first woman over 65 to run a sub-7:00 mile indoors, following this achievement into her 70's running 6:47 for 1500 meters, and world records from the 800 meters to the marathon. She was a fixture at The 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue Mile, was featured in Sports Illustrated, had a book and movie "Running On", and is the first thing you see when entering the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame. As Mary Wittenburg, President of NYRRC, said "Toshi is our Queen of the Roads...she represents the best of running."


During this time Toshi and Fred wanted to share their newfound love of running with their Ridgewood friends, and founded the North Jersey Master's Running Club. Their infectious spirit to be fit and have fun at the same time drew many people to the club and resulted in the start of the Ridgewood Memorial Day Run. RHS's Dave Marsh was one of those people who caught Toshi's fever, and introduced the concept of measured aerobic fitness to the high school physical education curriculum. Also during that time, Toshi discovered she had cervical cancer, but was fierce in her determination not to allow a disease to define or limit her. Four months after cancer surgery, she finished the Boston Marathon in 3:09.

After every race, the first thing Toshi did was to thank her feet. Then she'd have a beer. She viewed running as a cherished friendship. "I view running as a tool to help me get through life, so I do everything I can to nurture it, take care of it, appreciate it. I want to hold onto my friend for as long as I live." Toshi continued to do that until one month before she passed away in 2014. She will forever be remembered as an inspiration to those of us who were lucky enough to know her.



#### RICHARD BENNETT

When Richard Bennett applied for the boys soccer coach position, he was asked by the Athletic Director Dick Flectner if he thought he could win. He replied simply, yes. With 1021 wins later at Ridgewood High School, that simple response has certainly proven to be prophetic. During his 47 year coaching tenure, Richard has coached 4 varsity teams including boys' soccer (28 years), boys' golf (5 years), girls' basketball (13 years), and ooys and girls bowling (17 and counting). The Ridgewood boys' soccer team garnered 387 wins, 7 counts titles and 3 state sectional titles. The girls' basketball team had 212 wins and 1 county title during that tenure. The lowling team has 325 wins and two county titles. The boys golf team had 97 wins and two county titles.

n 1997, he was voted into the New Jersey Scholastic Coaches Association Hall of Fame. He was inducted into he Bergen County Soccer Century Club in 2000 as one of the five original inductees. Most recently in 2016, he was inducted into the New Jersey Soccer Hall of Fame as well as the State's Golf Hall of Fame.

Richard wasn't known only for coaching. In 1992, he was recognized as the top teacher in the state with the Dutstanding Physical Education Teaching Award. He attended the National Conference in Washington DC of that year. The following year, he was nominated for the Disney Teachers Award as one of the top 3 Physical Education teachers in the United States. In 1988, he spent 21 days participating in the Outward Bound program in Colorado. Using the principles he learned there, including trust, inner strength, and endurance beyond one's comfort zone, he was on the ground floor for bringing the project adventure program to Ridgewood High School for both students and adults. Richard was an innovator with his coaching as well. He was one of the first coaches to video his games and then watch them to discover his teams weaknesses. Many a Friday night was spent at his house as his soccer team would sit all around his living room eating homemade chocolate chip cookies and watching the games being played. Using the videos of the game, he would change his formations to match the talents of his team. He would go watch other teams play to find their strengths and would make adjustments to match them. While this is commonplace now, back in the 70's it wasn't.


Richard's coaching skills, combined with his persistence and solid work ethic, are legendary. He took over the girls basketball team in 1976 in the middle of the season, the team went on to lose every single game. In his first game he was losing 50-2 to Paramus at halftime. Never one to back down from a challenge, he drew from his philosophy from soccer--always be sound defensively. He practiced without a basketball and taught his team how to play defense. The next time he played Paramus that season, they lost by only 15. The following season, the team won their first game in 2 years and proceeded to make the states. They made the states every year that he coached.

When the bowling position opened in 1997, he jumped at the opportunity to coach the sport. He went to camps to learn how to be a bowling coach. He studied the correct way to throw a ball. Yet, he still kept his core values about how to be successful. Practice, hard work, and mental focus. Within 3 years, both the boys program and girls program had bowled to their highest averages in the history of the program. In 2004, the girls won the county tournament.

Success has followed him where ever he has gone. Although he has adapted to the changing times, discipline has always been there. While the athletes may have changed, the understanding of what brings about success has not. Richard Bennett has been fortunate to have coached many great athletes and people, and they have been equally fortunate to have had him coach them.

# LARRY COYLE Head Boys Cross Country Coach 1969-1997, Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field 1969-79

He might have achieved coaching and teaching greatness at Brandeis High School in New York City, or at the American school in Alexandria Egypt or in Taiwan.

But a potential teachers strike and a coaching opening led Larry Coyle to Ridgewood in 1968 and when he left coaching 29 years later, both parties were very happy that their paths had crossed.

Loyle, who passed away in August 2015, retired after the 1997 cross-country season, and even two lecades later, his influence and success have been hard to approach. In his 29 years as the Maroons' cross-country coach, Ridgewood won 15 league and divisional titles in the Northern New Jersey nterscholastic League, 12 Bergen Group 4 titles, 10 sectional Group 4 titles, and seven Bergen Meet of Champions titles. Ridgewood won the 1991 and 1992 State Group 4 championships, the only time a Bergen County team has gone back-to-back in the 70-year history of the group. Ridgewood also inished in the top five of the State Meet of Champions five times.

The soft-spoken (most of the time) Coyle ran track at Mount St. Michael's High School in the Bronx and at Iona before coming to Ridgewood to teach English. The next year, the Ridgewood principal remembered that Coyle had talked about track in his initial interview and Larry quickly was hired as the school's cross-country, indoor and outdoor track coach. He coached all three seasons for 11 years, starting the indoor program. While the Maroons didn't win any major team titles in indoor and outdoor track, Coyle coached 1972 Group 4 indoor two mile champ Bruce Mason and 1975 Group 4 outdoor 330 yard intermediate hurdles champ Parke Muth. Dropping from the head coaching ranks in indoor and outdoor track and field, Larry stayed on as the boy's cross-country coach with extraordinary success.

"In some ways, cross-country is the most enjoyable season, which is why I kept doing it after I gave up track. In some ways it's the simplest and the easiest because everyone's running the same event but it's also the purest high school sport," Coyle said in a 1997 interview upon his retirement from coaching.

Consistency was the hallmark of Coyle teams. They qualified for 24 of the 25 Bergen Meet of Champions races and finished in the top four the last 19 times they qualified, winning in 1978, 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1995 and 1996. The Maroons also qualified for 24 out of the last 25 state group 4 championships during Coyle's reign, with 10 runners-up finishes and three third place finishes in addition to the 10 titles.


And his contributions went beyond simply coaching track and cross-country. Along with fellow Ridgewood Hall of Fame inductee Jacob Brown and Mike Glynn, he started and co-directed the Ridgewood Winter Games, a pioneering indoor track meet at Rockland Community College, which began in the 1970s and the season opening Ridgewood Relays, now known as the Pawlowski Relays, in the spring. These two events, still going strong today, are important stops on the area's Indoor and Outdoor Track schedule.

Coyle is one of the great championship coaches in Ridgewood and Bergen County history, and even better than that, he was one of the finest gentlemen and teachers you'd ever hope to meet.





# JACOB BROWN Head Coach Girls Cross Country 1974-2014, Girls Track & Field 1972-2015

In 1971 Jacob Brown graduated from Penn State University with a Masters Degree in Exercise Physiology. The self-described "farm kid" from a little town 22 miles from Pittsburgh traveled to a job fair in Detroit looking for his first full-time job. And thanks to Dave Marsh, he found one in Ridgewood, New Jersey. He never left. "I knew nothing about Ridgewood and didn't even know where it was," Brown remembered nearly 45 years later. "I was going to teach and coach in high school for a few years and then go coach in college, where the "real" adventure was. What did I know?" Did anyone realize what a career was about to start? Hardly. How can you predict that when Brown retired in the spring of 2015 he would be generally considered one of the greatest coaches of any sport in Bergen County and New Jersey history with records unlikely to ever be approached, no less broken. Let's get those numbers out of the way ight here.

n cross-country, a dual meet record over 43 years of 243-15 including a 22-year (that's YEAR) unbeaten treak; 35 league titles, 29 Bergen County group titles, 28 Bergen Meet of Champions titles (in just 37 years), a state record 22 sectional titles, the 1992 and 1999 State Meet of Champions titles and 16 appearances in the State Meet of Champions. In outdoor track, 76 Bergen meet of champions winners and 15 state group champions, 16 Bergen group team titles, 15 league titles and 10 sectional crowns. And his 1988 Group 4 state champions placed in an astounding 11 of 14 events at the state championship and is considered one of the three best teams in New Jersey history.

But Jacob Brown's story is much more than the numbers. Marsh, who had hired him as a teacher, knew he wanted to coach and after Brown coached freshman boys cross-country the first fall, with fellow Hall of Fame inductee and lifelong friend Larry Coyle, Marsh asked him to help out with Ridgewood's brand new girls track team, coached by a long-forgotten female teacher who didn't want the assignment. "I introduce myself to her and she hands me the clipboard (with the names of the 17 girls on the team) and walks away," said Brown with a laugh in a 1975 interview on the New Jersey Milesplit website. "It was now my team." So Brown was left to teach all the events to an inexperienced but eager group of girls and try and figure out a schedule. So he called around and found programs at the Wayne high schools, Englewood, Paramus Catholic and Saddle Brook and put together a schedule. The early years of girls track weren't always greeted sympathetically by entrenched boys coaches, as Brown discovered one day at Montclair. "We were having a meet and the coach was running practice on the track while it was going on," Brown remembers. "We nearly came to blows but cooler heads prevailed. Of course later we became friends and he ended up coaching girls and telling me how much easier it was to coach them!"

Along with Coyle, Brown was a pioneer in establishing and running meets, such as the Ridgewood Invitational, the first cross-country invitational open to girls in New Jersey which lasted from 1973 to 2011 and the Ridgewood Relays (now called the Pawlowski Relays) still a staple of the spring schedule. His first decade at Ridgewood saw Brown coaching all three seasons. But sensing a loss of enthusiasm with the year-round grind, he gave up winter track in 1982, which helped fan his enthusiasm for the other two seasons for the rest of his career.


In 1983 his girls' four-mile team set a national high school record that lasted for 17 years. His 1975 4-x-880 team also held a national mark. He was named the Honorary High School Girls Referee at the Penn Relays in 2005 and was named the Mike Byrnes National Coach of the Year by the National Scholastic Sports Foundation in 2010. But perhaps his most outstanding qualification was his almost uncanny ability to keep cross-country runners on the team even with no chance of running varsity races in a sport whose slogan often is "Our Sport is Your Sport's Punishment." "Bonding is sometimes a hokey overused word but we worked on that," said Brown. "The kids became part of the gang and wanted to stay part of the gang." For more than 40 years Jacob Brown was the leader of the gang and what a gang it was.






## RIDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL Award for Excellence in Athletics

The Ridgewood High School Award for Excellence in Athletics is the highest honor a student athlete can receive from RHS. The athletes listed below were voted as the outstanding athletes of their class for their participation as a student athlete over the entire duration of their high school career.

With the advent of women participating to a greater extent as varsity athletes because of title XI legislation, the first class to recognize a female athlete for this prestigious award was the class of 1974. Research shows that women participated in varsity (major sport) athletics with the creation of the Ridgewood Athletic Association (RAA) in the period of 1913 to 1916 and continued participating in various sports until the 1930's. Female participation in interscholastic athletics can be traced back to the formation of the "Girls Athletic Club" in the 1904-05 school year. There were no male or female athletes recognized during that early period of athletic participation to receive this award.

The awards first recipient, a male, was in 1914, which coincides with the development of the RAA. From that point on the records show a drop off of female participation in varsity athletics starting in the late 1920's and disappearing entirely in the first part of the 1930s. Participation by females in varsity interscholastic athletics began to grow again in the 1970's to the point where it is today, sharing half the athletic participation of the student body.

The award originally was entitled the "Ridgewood High School Award for Excellence in Athletics." It was renamed the Rutgers Cup in the 1940s through sponsorship of an award given by a local patron. The original award name was reinstated in the 1950s and with the retirement of former athletic director Dave Vanderbush is now called the "Dave Vanderbush Award for Excellence in Athletics."



### THE FIRST VARSITY SOCCER TEAM AT RHS 1927



Interscholastic soccer was approved as a minor sport by the RHSAA in 1922 and elevated to varsity status in the fall of 1927.



SOCCER TEAM

After playing for many years as a minor sport the soccer squad has at last come into its own. Following much discussion and an election by the A. A. committee, soccer has become a major sport. The fine spirit of the squad certainly deserves this reward.

The team played a very average season this year, winning seven games out of fourteen played, losing six and tying one. The first game, played with East Rutherford, resulted in a 0 to 0 score. After this, victory and defeat seemed to come in alternate series. There were three triumphs over Eastern Academy, Barringer, and Hackensack, then two defeats at the hands of Rutherford and Harrison. Next came two more triumphs over the New York Stock Exchange and St. Benedict's, then three more defeats in games with Harrison, Kearny, and East Rutherford. A victory over Rutherford, a defeat from Kearny, and another victory over Hackensack finished up this peculiarly average season.

All of the games were hard fought and on an average the scores very close. The team was managed by Gordon Butler. The captain was Janowitz.



## Did you know?...Some RHS Athletic History

The girls athletic club (GAC) at Ridgewood High School began around 1905. There was no gymnasium available at the Beech Street location, so the girls negotiated gym space at the White Star Athletic Clubhouse. They played their first basketball game on Dec 22, 1906. The team record for 1906-07 was 7-4. In 1907 the team joined the New Jersey Interscholastic League, which also had as members the Hackensack, Englewood, Passaic and Orange High Schools.

The Boys and Girls Athletic Associations at Ridgewood High School joined together in 1913 with a common organization, The Ridgewood Athletic Association (RAA), which promoted the facilitation of interscholastic men's and women's athletics at Ridgewood. Many of the local high schools had women's sports that thrived in highly organized interscholastic leagues until the mid 1930's when most of the women's teams disappeared. It is theorized that, because of the great depression, athletics for women were cut for cost savings and replaced with periodic sport play days to fill the void.

The Boys Athletic Association (BAA) voted to add Football to its roster of athletic teams being sponsored for the first time in the fall of 1908. The team played 3 games that year. All of the games were played against the same competition, the Saginaw AC. The team record was 2 wins and 1 tie. It is recorded that RHS won their first ever football game 2-0, their second 5-0 and tied their third 5-5.

The BAA voted to drop Football for the 1909 season, but brought it back in 1910. By 1913, the football team at Ridgewood was regarded as one of the finest squads in Northern New Jersey and was referred to as the "Ridgewood Invincibles." The team went on to great acclaim that season and gained great recognition again in 1915 when the team went undefeated.

Basketball for Boys and Girls remained the main focus for interscholastic competition during the 1909-10 school year.

On March 19, 1914 it was reported in the Ridgewood Herald that the Ridgewood High School Girls Basketball team defeated Montclair High School at Montclair by the score of 18-17 for their first victory ever versus the "Mounties." Montclair had been the New Jersey state champion for three consecutive years prior to the RHS victory!

The first recorded reference to the RHS colors of "Maroon and White" were made in the winter issue of the 1910 Arrow (published seasonally) when describing the actions of the boy's basketball team as the "Maroon and White." The colors were officially declared in the written constitution of the Ridgewood High School Athletic Association (RAA), which was formed by the student body in 1913. The constitution was written sometime between 1913 and 1916. Article VIII Insignia Sec.1 states, "The colors of the Ridgewood High School are Maroon and White." Section 2 goes on to explain, "The insignia of the Ridgewood High School are the letters R.H.S. maroon and white; the letter R. in white."

Interestingly our tradition of giving a star for second, third, and now fourth year varsity letters was formulated in the original RAA constitution.

Section 4 under Article VIII states, "Only one letter shall be awarded to any student during the course for any one sport. For each additional year in which it services the requirements of the insignia as heretofore stated, shall be awarded a star."

In 1911, a baseball team was formed for the first time since 1906. As stated in the Arrow 1911 spring quarterly, "For the first game the Ridgewood team were faultlessly attired in their new suits which were cut décolleté and up to date in every particular and so becoming! However, this fact did not help them on to victory for they met with a glorious defeat at the hands of the Ridgefield Park High School - which the score of 7-2 will show. This is not discouraging for with the able assistance of their new coach Dr. Whitney, and the enthusiasm the national game always inspires, and the necessary practice they expect to reach satisfactory results in games that are scheduled for the future."

The first track meet was held at RHS June 6, 1913, which became an annual interclass (intramural) competition. There was a call to organize an interscholastic team for 1914. Records show that in the spring of 1914, a banner was won by RHS for defeating Paterson in a dual meet with each school having won a leg of a three meet competition, the next winner would be eligible to keep the banner.

A group of RHS athletes went to the Thirteenth Regimental Armory in Brooklyn on January 5, 1915 to compete for the Eastern Scholastic Championship. Practices were carried out through the winter months, "In order to prepare for this and various other track meets." Further, "This practice will be for everybody because of the coming Interclass Meet and the Badge contest."

The first recorded soccer match at RHS took place October 27, 1918 with the freshman class defeating the sophomore class 2-0. The junior and senior classes also played, but no record of a score has been found. The elementary schools competed in a highly organized interschool soccer league as far back as 1912 according to articles found in the Ridgewood Herald. They were divided into junior and senior levels of competition.

The Ridgewood Herald of December 17, 1914 reported that the Harrison Avenue School won the public school soccer championship at both the senior and junior levels. They were followed in the standings by the combined team (junior and senior level) of Beech Street and Union Street Schools, then Kenilworth School and Monore Street School. The Erie Avenue School did not participate because of low enrollment.

The March 19, 1914 edition of the Ridgewood Herald reported that money for the new soccer ball for the public school league was donated to principal Brooks by a "spirited citizen" who saw the principal on the way to the train station, noting he had heard of the need for a new ball. The citizen wanted to remain anonymous for his kind deed.

After many years playing as minor sport, soccer became a varsity sport in the fall of 1927. The sport was given major sport status after much discussion and an election by the RAA committee. As stated in the 1927 Arrow, "The fine spirit of the squad certainly deserves this reward."

The first cross country meet at RHS was run on November 22, 1918. It was an interclass competition over a two and one half mile course with the finish on the new football field (now located at RHS) before the crowd that had gathered to watch the home gridiron battle with Marist High School.

In 1915, the students of RHS had an intense fund raising campaign to complete the refurbishing of the new athletic field at RHS, which is now the new field turf stadium. They surpassed their goal of raising \$1,600, reaching nearly \$1,700. The fund raising total was kept on a giant board resembling a thermometer in a location that is now Wilsey Square. The athletic field was purchased in 1913 and has been used ever since for Ridgewood High School Athletic contests. The first RHS team to use it was the football team for the 1913 season, even though RHS would not be open to students until May of 1919. It is clear at this time that the athletic field property, currently our high school stadium complex, was purchased as part of the property secured on East Ridgewood Avenue by the Board of Education in 1913 in hopes of constructing a new high school in the not too distant future. The property, not including the Stevens Field site, was purchased from Captain Edwards at a cost of \$30,000.

Prior to the purchase of the athletic field location that is now on the west side of the high school, a large field was often used for athletics which was owned by the Masons and located approximately where the Masonic Temple is now, just off of South Maple Avenue. The Masons also owned a large field space across from the old golf club grounds, now present day Veterans Field, which was also used for sporting events. The old YMCA grounds were often used for athletic contests also.


It was reported in the October 16, 1913 Ridgewood Herald that a group of citizens wanted to organize a group to oversee the organization, supervision, administration of and development of the town's (Ridgewood) inter school sports and games. This is a long ago predecessor of the "Sports Council" that we know of today that represents all of the youth sports activities in the village.

The 1913 group would be known as the "Athletic Advisory Council" and act in the same capacity as the organization in New York City that oversaw the administration of "The Public School Athletic League." According to the records, a motion was made to the Ridgewood Board of Education for approval. It was approved and Dr. Craig would be the lead advisor of a committee that would include community members Frank Kyothe, Rev. Charles O. Wright, Philip L. Shuyler, Charles Woodworth and Mr. Lousing P. Wood, who would represent the local Home and School Association, the Parent Teacher Association and the Alumni of the Ridgewood Public Schools.




## THE RIDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL THAT NEVER WAS!


In March of 1915 it was proposed by the Ridgewood Board of Education to build a new Ridgewood High School on the property acquired by the Board of Education from a Captain Edwards in 1913. The Board had spent \$30,000 in purchasing the land "on the hill" that is now home to RHS bordering on East Ridgewood Avenue. The cost of the new high school structure would be \$225,000 to construct and promised to be a spectacular facility to bring great educational opportunity to all of the children of the village and the surrounding communities. (Ridgewood had students from Glen Rock, Paramus, Midland Park, HoHoKus, and beyond). The old high school (the current Ed Center) was becoming highly overcrowded and according to some, unsanitary. Portable classrooms were brought in, (much the same as we have done in the 1970's, 80's and 90's) and many in town argued that this was enough to solve the problem and wished to be spared the expense of having to spend for any new construction. Ridgewood was facing some significant financial burdens at the time.


Another faction argued that the Edwards property was unsuitable and pushed to have a vote on the acquisition of a new site called the "DeMund-Mastin option." That option would have put Ridgewood High School closer to the center of town with the high school property being bordered on the North by East Ridgewood Avenue, the South by Dayton Street and the West by Oak Street. To the East were the lands of David D. Zabriskie and the estate of John McCroden, putting the high school essentially on the site that once was the acreage that made up the old Archibald-Vroom farmstead. The asking price was \$62,000. In an editorial that appeared in the Ridgewood Herald dated November 18, 1915, EB Lilly, arguing in favor for the Edwards site, stated, "It has more over in the contiguity of a fine athletic field, one of the most potent factors in fostering that school spirit which is so important to the development of any high school or college." Debate raged for months when finally a committee of town leaders and the women of the community brought the issue to a head in January of 1916. In one of the largest turn outs for a vote in the town's history to that point, the proposal to purchase the DeMund-Mastin tract was defeated by a total of over 1,100 against to 70 for. The Edwards's property purchased in 1913 was declared the site that the new high school would be built on.

In a vote that followed a few weeks later, the plan to build a new high school passed by nearly a 4 to 1 ratio. A new architectural firm was chosen from over forty submissions. The firm of Tracey L. Swartwout of New York was awarded the job. The firm had recently designed the plans for the new state capitol building in Missouri. An amount equal to the original proposal to build the high school, \$225,000, was approved for the project by the Board of Education and the building we now know with its classic lines, tower, and large cupola was born. Classes began to occupy the new building in May of 1919.

## **History of the Robb Football Trophy**

## 'The epitome of all good virtues'

As football season at Ridgewood High School gets under way, take a moment to read about an RHS football star from 73 years ago whose name comes back year after year.

A few of Ridgewood's 113 Honored Dead have been memorialized by friends and family so that even to this day we recognize their gifts and their sacrifice. One such memorial was created in the name of Richard Robb and is valued to this day.

Sometimes known as Roscoe, Robb lived at 12 E. Ridgewood Ave. and 334 Prospect St. His only brother died in 1934. He attended elementary school in Ridgewood, was a Boy Scout and was active in the High School League at West Side Presbyterian Church. He also worked an afternoon job at a local Texaco Station.

Before graduating from RHS in 1941 he was in the Willow Club, played the trumpet in the swing band, acted in the junior play and was on the music committee for the senior prom.

A lineman on the football team, his football coach later said, "Richie was the epitome of all good virtues. He was an aggressive football player who ran like a deer.

Roscoe went to Virginia Tech and later to Lafayette College to study engineering. While there, he was a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity. He joined the service and received his aerial gunner's wings at Ellington Field in Laredo, Texas in October 1943 and his commission at

the Bombardier Quadrangle School in Childress, Texas on Feb. 26, 1944.

He was then assigned to Barksdale Field in Shreveport. La. Two months later, on April 15, 1944, he married June Gorham, his RHS classmate. in the Post Chapel at Barksdale Field. Three months later, he was best man at the marriage of another eventual Ridgewood casualty, Ronnie Helps.

As a member of the 584th Bomber Squadron, 394th Bomb Group Medium (9th AAF), he moved overseas in late August 1944. Flying the B-26 "Marauder" and the Douglas A-26 "Invader," the 394th hit strong points at Brest and then began to operate against targets in Germany. Robb's "Marauder" was powered by two 2,000HP engines, manned by a crew of six, carried a bomb load of up to 5,200 pounds and was customarily armed with 10 30- and 50-caliber machine guns.

In October 1944, a revised interdiction program targeted rail lines further to the east and required attacks by all 4 Tactical

Air Commands of the 9th AF. with support from the British 2nd Tactical AF. More than 300 B-26s and A-20s, with fighter

escort, hit strong points and bridges over wide areas of Eastern France and Western

Robb was engaged in low level bombing of railroad bridges and yards in the Rhine River Valley on their 138th mission. Flying out of Cambrai/Niergnies, France, Robb was killed Sunday, Oct. 8, 1944, when his B-26 col-

lided with another plane while landing upon return from a mission against the railroad bridge:

In 1983, his friends created th Robb Football Trophy at RHS, which is still presented to the outstanding varsity lineman upo the player's graduation in June. Roscoe is buried in Plot B, Row 20, Grave 71 at Epinal American

Cemetery, Epinal, France.
At death, he was 21 years old.

## FOOTBALL

Given very little chance at the outset of the 1940 season, the R.H.S. football team proved its mettle by becoming one of the best to represent the Maroon in recent years. Teamwork and good spirit marked its efforts in all games and lack of weight was more than overcome by its speed and ag-

gressiveness.

Led by Co-captains Bill Moore, tackle, and Pete Brown, back, the Maroon went through six straight before suffering its first set-back. Leonia was deleated 13-7 in the opener in a game which showed the versatility of the veteran "pony" backfield. The fol-lowing week, Hackensack was de-feated for the first time since 1936 by the score of 13-0. In the third game, Ridgewood was forced to come from behind in the last five minutes in order to tiet Lodi 6-6. The Maroon continued its unbeaten way in its fourth encounter with Hawthorne 18-0 but was again forced to come from behind in its game with Lyndhurst, which finally ended 6-6. On Election Day, Passaic Valley, a new opponent, was soundly trounced 39-0. Pompton Lakes brought the undefeated string to an end by decisively trimming the Maroon 27-7,

but some prestige was retained as this was the first touchdown ever scored by Ridgewood against Pompton. Ridgewood continued its slump against Clifford Scott and lost 31-13. Some consolation may be had over these defeats since both teams which defeated Ridgewood were later awarded State Championships. The annual Thanksgiving Day game ended the season successfully as Westfield was defeated


Pete Brown, Frank Bradley, Don Mc-Cullough and Bob Crandall composed Ridgewood's pony backfield with Frank handling the bulk of the passing attack which was a big factor in the success of the team. On the line, Bill Moore, Dick Simpson, and Stan Frank were stand-outs. Dick Casey, Paul Cook, Don Coyle, Rex Gearon, George Henry, Roger Probert and Richie Robb were other Senior letter winners.

With six letter-men from the Junior Class, two from the Sophomore Class and several promising prospects from among the numeral winners as a nucleus for the team next fall, it is hoped that R.H.S. will carry on from where it left off last November.






RHS Football Team, 1925-1926



RHS Track Team, 1925-1926




RHS Baseball Team, 1925-26

Marion Delamater, class of 1924, writes an editorial about the lack of opportunity for girls to participate in varsity athletics at RHS! Women received the right to vote two years earlier when the 19th Amendment to the constitution was ratified August 18, 1920 guaranteeing a women's right to vote! Fifty years later, in 1972, Title IX legislation was passed, which allowed female athletics to expand protecting the rights of people from discrimination based on gender in educational institutions, programs or activities that receive federal financial assistance.

#### MORE INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS FOR GIRLS

This year, in chapel, it was announced that the boys are to two new sports, soccer and cross-country running. These two, with the other sports already open to the boys, make six different branches of athletics in which the boys of R. H. S. may earn school letters. That is all well and good, but what about the girls? Three years ago the Girls' Basketball Team was organized. Last year and this year the girls have had a hard time to persuade the authorities to let them have the team continued. It is true that the team has not been very successful, but it has been more successful than the boys' team and it must be remembered that the girls did not have basketball until three years ago. Last year the team expected to have a good year, but through poor refereeing and non-support of the student body, it became discouraged and finished third. But this year the girls have a good squad, and, with the support of the school will make a good try for the champinghin. championship.

Enough for basketball. Why can't the girls have other sports which to earn letters? The complaint has been made that only a few girls can play on the basketball team. Granted, but if there were more sports for the girls to win their 'R's' in, there would be more girls going out for athletics.

I believe that Mr. Somerville's plan is to have inter-class teams in the various branches of athletics. I think that is a good plan but I also think that interscholastic athletics for the girls would be better. Participating in games with other schools would give the girls better school spirit. There can't be any doubt but that every girl in this school would like to earn an 'R' and the 'R' would be a big incentive to the girls. There is not as much interest in inter-class athletics as in interscholastic. Then, too, I believe that the majority of students in this school are girls: therefore, the number of girls who support the A. A. equals or exceeds the number of boys; and yet the boys have six intergris: therefore, the number of gris who support the A. A. equals or exceeds the number of boys; and yet the boys have six interscholastic sports and the girls one. Why should the boys spend six sevenths of the A. A. fund to the girls' one-seventh, when they are in the minority? Too much time spent on athletics would affect the studies, but if each girl had to have a fair report of her studies every so often or be dropped from her particular squad until her marks are better, there would be no need for complaint on that core.

But the most important thing which interscholastic athletics teaches so much better than inter-class is sportmanship. When you are having a game with your friends as opponents, for that is all an inter-class game is, you might think that, if you should gently but firmly push that opponent of yours out of the way without the referee's being able to see you, she wouldn't mind very much as you are a friend of hers. But when you have been the college of th shoved around by a girl you don't know, you appreciate the ing which some girl has when you treat her that way, and you like the sound of that golden rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you". Or if you chance to play against a girl who is playing just as fairly as she can and saving you all



he unnecessary jolts that she can, believe me, you try your very best to do the same to her.

school and not just a "paying subscriptions" and "cheering"




Until the early 1930's the Ridgewood High School yearbook The Arrow was published in four segments. The edition published in the Fall usually had as one of its main themes the state of the athletics programs at RHS. In this issue from ninety four years ago, November 1922, we can see the development of some of the athletic programs Ridgewood still has today as well as some that we don't. Girls (Field) Hockey is mentioned and was sponsored off and on throughout the 1920s. RHS dropped Girls Field Hockey after the 1982 season with the introduction of Girls Soccer into the athletic program in 1983. We find that Ridgewood did sponsor girls basketball the winter of 1922-23 in organized fashion and played in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic league with the 1922-23 edition of the team, mentioned in this quarterly, going on to win the first ever girls interscholastic championship at the school. That team was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2008. We also see that Boys Soccer was introduced at the interscholastic level as a minor sport for the first time and would gain status as a major varsity sport for the 1927 season. Boys Cross Country is introduced for the first time in 1922 as well as the idea of Freshman Football. A history of Ridgewood Football is given in this quarterly and it might be mentioned that the account of the 1913 team gives reason as to why that team was inducted into the RHS Athletic Hall of Fame in 2014 as one of the first great interscholastic teams representing the school and setting a standard for what we call our "Tradition of Excellence "today.



#### RIDGEWOOD FOOTBALL, PAST AND PRESENT

Sportsmanship is an attitude of mind which seeks to find expression in certain qualities. It is very readily applied to athletics and school activities or life. One sees the most emphatic illustration of this spirit in athletics. Here one learns to fight for victory in a fair and square way. Men who have the requisites, vim, vigor, and stamina, have no better field to test them in than football.

tory in a fair and square way. Men who have the requisites, vinivity, vigor, and stamina, have no better field to test them in than football.

From the time of the founding of our Athletic Association in Ridgewood High School, football has rapidly grown in favor in Ridgewood until today it is one of our major sports, well supported and well played. From the good old days when football was first played here up to this present season we have had pretty much the same opponents, and a summary of clashes with these teams shows that Ridgewood is to the fore in most cases.

In the days of 1913 in Ridgewood we have a fine example of past football. The high school started practice in September with eighteen men, and no coach but the captain. Captain Donnelly developed his team of that year into a fast, hard, clean-playing bunch. In that year we had such men as Hopper, conspicious on account of his line plunging and punting, Pagano to rake in the forward passes, and Todd with his fine defensive work. This same Hopper, who played for Ridgewood, later achieved fame on the gridiron as captain of Pennsylvania. The standard which this group of stars helped to set established a precedent which Ridgewood has always tried to live up to. That year, pitted against some of the strongest teams, Ridgewood High School scored 246 points to its opponents' 68. Many a severe jolt was given to the aspirations of other schools by our warriors of that day.

Each succeeding year has been nearly as successful for the Red and White. In recognition of the efforts of our men an order was established about 1914 by the football team that was known as the Order of the "R". The requirements to be a wearer of the sacred "R" were very strict as compared to those of today. A player had to play in 50 per cent. of the games, not less than 4. Today it is 25 per cent. of the numbers of games played.

In former years these teams which so successfully carried the high school to victory had no such incentive as regularly organized cheering. Modes of travel to

A few years later we have men whose names are more familiar to us. In 1917-18, people were dubious as to the outcome of our football team because of the loss of such stars as Runk, M. Hopper, and others. The pessimists lost out, however. Other men stepped up to brighten the fame of our school. Caramella, Beatty, T. White, Troup, and Ford all came to the fore in the next couple of years. At this time our present coach, Judson Ford, played a very modest but hard game at guard.

A personage by the name of Mr. Tack L. Dummie made his

A personage by the name of Mr. Tack L. Dummie made his first appearance in Ridgewood and according to an article by Mr. Ford, in a previous issue of the Arrow, his influence was considerably felt in the high school.

siderably felt in the high school.

In 1917-18 a very successful year was experienced as the following score would indicate: R. H. S. 47—Cliffside 0; R. H. S. 38—Passaic 0; R. H. S. 27—Rutherford 0. Other games just as profitable for us followed. In 1918 and 1919 a new group of stars loomed up to carry on the good work. The backfield was one worthy of recognition, consisting of Joe Batchelor, H. B.; Gwynn Fielding, H. B.; Dave Shannon, Q. B.; and Duncan Cheel, F. B. The spirit of the school took a big jump up the ladder this year. Mellie Hiler first won fame at this time which earned him the position of all state center in 1921.

During this year many spectacular games were played. One battle of the season brought out the same "do or die" sphit as shown by Ridgewood teams in former years. In this game Bill Drier was "knocked out" six times but each time "came back" typically illustrating the fighting spirit of the team. Gwynn Fielding was also "knocked out" for the first time in his career as a football player.

A game with Paterson High School about this time showed what our "crew of huskies" really could do. The score was 38—0. This score was piled up against one of the best teams Paterson had turned out in several seasons. Last year we again met Paterson after a respite, and this game, replete with thrills, kept the audience continually on edge. The score was 7—0. About this time Rutherford, champions for three years and would-be champions of the time, clashed with Ridgewood on the gridinon in a game which will long be remembered. Four touchdowns to one shows what perseverance and hard playing did for us. This indomitable fighting spirit of past, present and future is one of Ridgewood's greatest assets on the football field.

As in the colleges, football in the high schools has made rapid

As in the colleges, football in the high schools has made rapid advancement. The teams of football in Ridgewood today will rank as the standard set by other schools, our rivals Passaic, Rutherford, Englewood and Hackensack. True it is that a team cannot always be champions but we try to follow up the example and record before us as set by previous Ridgewood teams. The eleven we have today and the outlook for next year and ensuing years is good. One of the main reasons for this belief is the fact that we are fairly sure of having a permanent coach, Mr. Ford. In the past the coach has been with us for one season at a time and then again not at all. This is a handicap to any school.

The defense seems good when it comes to a pinch. With Cliff-side and then once again this year the team has demonstrated this by standing like a stone wall with the ball on their own 5 yard line or thereabout. These facts when summed up compare fairly well with facts of the same nature from previous years. Next year a number of the good men will be back and start us off on one of our best schedules.

Thus in speaking of football both past and present in Ridgewood one might say that it has embodied the true spirit of Ridgewood High School; that it has always brought forth the truer, finer, qualities of school spirit that only clean fair play can produce. And because football has done so much to advance and uphold the traditions of the school it is to be hoped that it will always be a dominating sport in the future. Much has been said about the football player but the following lines seem to describe him perfectly:

He's just one man of the eleven, A cog, or a link in the chain; The best type of man under heaven, A user of muscle and brain.

For ev'ry wrong move he is scolded; He knows he must play hard and clean; Sometimes for his good work they praise him, And sometimes he does it unseen.

The crowd is but fickle and changing; It's ready to cheer or abuse. He knows how to take knocks or praises; He knows how to win—and to lose. —Author unknown.

**Building Blocks:** Representing the building and metaphor for the strength, endurance, and focus required to produce excellent athletes

**Sports in Silhouette:** A collage of many sports played by students of RHS, representing a sense of movement and action inherent in sports

Clock Tower: A historic distinguishing feature of RHS

### The "R"

**Torch:** From the school insignia, the flame symbolizes the creative spirit, the sense of timelessness and the passing along of traditions and training in sports

The technique is traditional leaded stained glass: colored glass cut and joined together with lead. Details of the laurels will be acid etched. Figures will be painted and fired.






