

The Ridgewood Athletic Hall of Fame is affiliated with the Ridgewood Public Schools and acts as a representative body of Ridgewood High School as designated by the Ridgewood Board of Education. 





The RAA (Ridgewood Athletic Association) officially declared the high school colors as "Maroon and White' in their bylaws dated 1916.



Despite her 5'2" 113-pound frame, athleticism never was a problem for star gymnast Chelsea Steinberg. She continued to Wow crowds throughout her four-year high school career at RHS as well as providing incredible moments as a member of the University of New Hampshire's gymnastic team for another four years. In a 2011article by Jim Furlong it was stated that "Chelsea was the best gymnast in the history of Ridgewood High School" It can also be noted that at the time she was also considered the best gymnast to ever come out of the state of New Jersey.


Steinberg recalled that when she was little, her mother would watch her roll around on the floor prompting her mom to get her involved at the U.S. Gymnastics training Center in Mahwah where she continued to train for the next thirteen years. Chelsea recalled "the day I started they kept moving me up. I -never got to do another sport". After a couple of years, she realized that she was dedicated to the sport and as a student at Willard Elementary School and George Washington Middle School she decided to concentrate on gymnastics throughout her years at RHS which left no time for other sports. Her dedication to her sport paid off with large accomplishments culminating with an athletic scholarship to UNH for four years beginning in the fall of 2007.

Chelsea's accomplishments in the sport stand alone as some of the greatest individual accomplishments ever seen in the history of athletics at RHS as well as in Bergen County and the state. Besides a plethora of accomplishments at the league level Chelsea won Bergen County championships in all four years she competed. In 2003 vault, uneven bars, floor exercise and all around. In 2004 Uneven bars, balance beam, floor exercise and all around. In 2005 vault, uneven bars, balance beam floor exercise and all around. In 2006 vault, uneven bars, balance beam and all around. She was the New Jersey state sectional champion in 2003,04,05,06 on uneven bars and balance beam. She also won the vault and all around in 2003 and 06 with championships being won in 2003 and 2005 in floor exercise.

In 2004 Chelsea won the outright New Jersey state championship in vault, balance beam, floor exercise and all around as well as winning the state all around championship in 2005 and 2006. She also captured the state championship in the vault again in 2006. In the state sectional competition that year Chelsea scored the only perfect 10 ever recorded in that competition in any event (she did it in the vault). Chelsea was named the Bergen Record's athlete of the decade and Darin Cooper of the Record selected her the toughest competitor he had seen in all high school athletics for that same ten year period.


Chelsea went on to have a stellar intercollegiate career at the University of New Hampshire. Her coach is quoted as saying that on any given day Chelsea was as good as anyone in the country on the balance beam. She was the EAGL balance beam champion in 2010, earned EAGL first team conference honors all four years. She was recognized as an NACGC/W All American and EAGL All-Academic team member all four years. She was an NCAA Scholastic All American2007-2011, team co-captain 2010-2011 and team MVP 2010-2011. Chelsea is an outpatient Occupational Therapy specialist on a new team at New York Presbyterian Hospital today and tonight is one of the newest members of the RHS Athletic Hall of Fame.

Mark Arthur Strittmatter is a 1987 graduate of Ridgewood High School. He is the only known Ridgewood graduate to have played officially in professional baseballs "Major Leagues". At RHS Mark had a standout baseball career. Known for his "rocket" arm, his agility, quickness and blocking ability "Stritt" was a natural for the catcher position. His athletic ability made him equally adept to play anywhere on the field. When not catching, he demonstrated exceptional skill and range at shortstop. Known as a line drive hitter, Mark went on to play baseball at Morris County Junior College in Randolph NJ. After two years at Morris, he transferred to Virginia Commonwealth University.

At VCU, Mark was the Rams starting catcher (1991-1992) batting .333 in 107 games. His 1992 team won the Metro Conference Championship.

Mark was a member of the first Colorado Rockies June draft in 1992 and was assigned to the franchise's first minor league team in Bend Oregon. As a member of the "Bend Rockies" he played in the first game ever for the Colorado Rockies organization on June 16,1992. The major league team was to take the field for the organization a year later.


Mark became a fixture on the organizations depth chart as a catcher. He quickly moved up to Triple-A ball with the Colorado Spring Sky Sox, but was stalled one step under the major league level. In September of 1998 he got the call he'd always waited for bringing him up to the "Big Leagues". Mark made his Major League debut as the starting catcher for the Colorado Rockies on 9/3/98 at County Stadium in Milwaukee. Mark spent most of his nine-year playing career in the Colorado Rockies organization, finishing with a San Diego Padres affiliate before retiring. During his time as a player, he came to Coors Field in Denver during the 1998 All-Star festivities to serve as a catcher in the National League bullpen. Mark made his first All-Star appearance at Yankee Stadium in July, 2008, serving on the National League All-Star coaching staff led by Clint Hurdle.


Mark has made a career in professional baseball, continuing as a coach at both the Major League and Minor League level. He has worked for both the Pittsburgh Pirate and Colorado Rockies organizations. Prior to joining the Pittsburg coaching staff, Mark spent eight years (2003-2010) working in the Bullpen for the Colorado Rockies. He served as the Catching Coach in 2008 and 2009 and is currently the teams catching coordinator. In addition, Mark has served as the hitting coach for the pitchers.


Even though Mark spent two years in Pittsburgh with the Pirates, he has worn the Rockies uniform longer than anyone in Rockies franchise history. His tenure dates to the beginning of the organization in 1992 and as Mark stated in an article written in the Denver Post "I was there the first day with the Bend team and I have seen a lot over the years" Mark will continue to serve in the Colorado Rockies organization as their Minor League Catching Coordinator, serving their entire Minor League system..


Mark lives in Denver with his wife Katie and also finds time to work for his youth baseball foundation.





Jim Dee has found a way to make a living doing what he loves to do, play golf according to the "Patriot Ledgers "article "It has been that way most of Dee's life and make no mistake, he is more than happy the way it has worked out." Jim has had a long and highly regarded tenure as a PGA teaching Pro.


Jim's process to becoming an athlete worthy of induction into the Ridgewood High school Athletic Hall Of Fame actually begins with his father Harry Dee the famous golf pro who ran the golf operations at the famous Ridgewood Country Club for many years. Golf was a part of Jim's DNA. He was one of three Dee boys Jim, John and Tom all of whom became involved with golf as a profession. Their dad Harry was voted New Jersey PGA player of the year in 1966 and in 1978 the Dee family was selected as the national golf family of the year. As a youngster Jim was included in the inner circle of his father's golf world. Jim got to meet many of the greats along the way through his father's playing on the PGA tour. Men like Sam Snead, Byron Nelson, Arnold Palmer and Ben Hogan served as inspirations to his development in the game. Growing up in New Jersey as the son of a prestigious golf pro, Jim enjoyed the life and lifestyle that encompassed that world.

Luckily Jim attended Ridgewood High School which at the time had a very strong golf program under the tutelage of Frank Mozeleski his sophomore and junior years and Dick Bennett his senior year. Under their guidance and that of others, Jim went on to have a stellar high school career for the Maroons. He was first team all NNJIL in 1970, 71 and 72. He was voted to the first team All Bergen County team in 1972 and led the team to the New Jersey state team championship in 1970 shooting an 83 in the tournament final. In 1971 his team was 20-1 winning league, county and state sectional titles and in 1972 Jim was captain of the team leading the Maroons to the league, county and state sectional championship and winning the individual Bergen County title shooting a 74 in the championship round.


Amazingly Jim had a tremendous growth spurt going into his senior year at RHS which accelerated his developments as a basketball player. Having played hoops for the Maroons in 1970 and 71(He was a Bergen Record athlete of the week for basketball in 1972) Jim exploded onto the county hoop scene averaging 18 points and 8 rebounds a game his senior year leading the team to a 22-7 record and winning the Bergen County Championship. He was named to the all county team for the 1972 season.

At 6"9" then Holy Cross basketball coach George Blaney offered Jim a basketball scholarship to attend the famous school in Worcester Mass. Jim accepted and had a stellar four year basketball and golf career for the Crusaders. He was captain of the golf team his senior year in 1976 while scoring 763 career points for the basketball squad. He averaged 10 points a game with 5 rebounds his senior year on an NIT bound 22-10 team. Jim retired now resides with his wife Mary in Hobe Sound Florida.

In 2009 Ridgewood High School girls head soccer coach Jeff Yearing stated about then senior Kelly Conheeney.."Kelly is the best overall soccer player ever to wear the Ridgewood uniform. have been many with amazing abilities within certain parameters of the game, but none can surpass Kelly's over all grasp of what is needed to excel anywhere on the field on either side of the ball under any condition. Kelly possesses great tactical foresight There, great technical ability and can use finesse or explosive moves to beat an opponent to pass or score. Her defensive contributions and abilities are second to none".

This statement was somewhat prophetic as Kelly went on to be the only girls soccer player in the history of Ridgewood High School to achieve the ultimate goal of playing professionally in what many consider to be the best women's professional soccer league in the world, the NWSL (National Women's Soccer League). It was a long road to the professional level for Kelly with many twists and turns.

A four-year starter at RHS, Kelly Conheeney was a four-time selection to 1st team all-league, 3-time selection to the New Jersey Girls Soccer Coaches Association All State team, and was named as one of the New Jersey Soccer Coaches Association 20 players in the state for 2008. Kelly was also named 1st team All County and the Bergen Record Newspaper's North Jersey player of the year. She was also named to the Newark Star Ledger's first team all groups all state team and named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's Regional All-American team. Kelly is the only player in RHS history to be voted twice to the leadership position of Co- Capt. of the varsity team. She is also only the fourth player in the history of girls soccer at RHS to eclipse the career 200point mark with 208 total career points on 78 goals (4th on the all-time goals scored 11st) and 52 assists (2nd on the all-time asst. list). The other three girls to achieve this offensive level are now members of the Hall of Fame.

Kelly helped the Montclair Aristocrats win three state championships and was a member of the regional national championship ODP team in 2007 and national finalist in 2008. She traveled with the region 1 ODP team in 2009 to Russia to play against the U19 national teams from Russia, the Ukraine, Estonia and Poland.


Kelly accepted a soccer scholarship to attend Virginia Tech Univ. Through all of her success on the field Kelly developed a false sense that injury wise nothing could go wrong, and nothing seemed to through her junior year at Virginia Tech. She'd been vital to the Hokies since stepping onto campus, starting all 68 matches in her 3 seasons, posting 26 goals and 21 assists. She already was the program's career all-time leader in points and game-winning goals with 75 and14respectively. Her goals had beaten North Carolina and won the first two NCAA tournament games as the Hokies, in her third year, reached the Sweet 16 for the first time. She was the first female soccer player at Tech to record at least 20 goals and 20 assists in her career with 26goals and 23 assists. Her freshman season she earned ACC all freshman and All ACC tournament team honors, her sophomore year she also had call ups to both the U20andU23 national team camps and in her junior year was named the teams co MVP for the year, and was selected to the NCAA all Southeast team and the All-ACC team.

Kelly suffered a series of concussions playing for the Ottawa Fury of the W league the summer before her senior season at Va.Tech. A header in the second match of her senior year at Tech would put Kelly out of the game as a player for the next 3 and a half years, the cumulative effect of multiple concussions sustained over the course of her career. She graduated from Tech in 2012 with a degree in communications. She had a strong desire to be able to make a difference in the world and joined an organization with a global mission called "Coaches Across Continents" traveling to third world countries and using soccer as an instrument for change influencing young women's lives. Kelly spent a year and a half traveling and bringing programs that impacted individuals and communities in the arena of human rights and social justice. Cambodia, Indonesia, South Africa, the Congo, Tanzania, Columbia, Haiti and the Philippines are places she traveled to and became familiar with. She found it was, and I quote, "the only thing that could have replaced soccer and made me as happy as I could have been during that time."


Kelly returned home in 2015 with as strong desire to pursue her dream of playing professionally and was cleared to return to play through tests, evaluations and consultation through the concussion program at the Univ. of Pittsburgh in Feb of 2016. Three weeks later Kelly went through open tryouts and was offered a contract to play professionally for Sky Blue of the NWSL Her career also brought her professional stays with the Houston Dash of the NWSL and Hammarby IF of Sweden's professional women's league.

Today Kelly resides in Santa Monica California and is a coach with the Los Angeles Bulls Soccer Club. In 2016 she was the first player ever inducted into the NJ Girls Soccer Coaches Assoc. Hall of Fame. Tonight, she adds the RHS HOF to those honors.

Underneath the senior picture of Carlos Peay in the 1951 Arrow yearbook of Ridgewood High School is his senior quote which reads "A mighty man in the game of sports," It would also be fitting to note that later in Carlos's life he would also be known as a mighty man of the law.

There were many firsts that Carlos achieved in his life starting with being named the first African American named a captain of the Ridgewood High School Football team. Later in his life he would be the first African American appointed as the assistant Bergen County prosecutor.

Carlos was a 3-year letter winner and star running back on the 1948,49 and 1950 football teams. He was an All-League and All Suburban selection in 1949 adding All County and All State honors as well, during a stellar undefeated and untied season in 1950 that found the Maroons the cream of the crop not only of the Bergen County gridiron scene, but as one of the top teams in the state.


He was a leader on a team (1950) that brought great renown. According to the RHS Arrow yearbook, "without doubt one of the most notable events...was the successful completion of the first unbeaten and untied football season on the records of the school in thirty-five years" (A reference to back to the great RHS football team of 1915)"The feats in other rings at the RHS circus will be forgotten by all but the star performers long before the accomplishments of 1950's gridders pass on to oblivion". Those accomplishments would include those of Carlos Peay. Besides football Carlos was a three-time letter winner in track and a two-year member of the bowling team.

Carlos did not pursue an athletic career outside of his high school commitment, but it seems he had enough on his plate to keep him engaged in many leadership positions that he was well prepared for in part by his storied athletic career at RHS.

Carlos went on to attend Howard University in Washington DC. where was actively involved in Howard's R.O.T.C. program. Carlos graduated and enlisted in the U.S. Army. After serving three years in the military, he enrolled at Rutgers University Law School 1960 where he earned his law degree with honors. According to a story from the Ridgewood Newspapers Carlos "walked off with four first prizes and awards given to 1963 graduates of Rutgers Law School.

Carlos went on to create his own private law practice. He was also a very active member of the Bergen County branch of the N.A.A.C.P. and was the founding member of Kappa Theta Lambda's Bergen County Chapter. He was also a proud member of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity. Throughout his life Carlos lived by the code of a champion and we welcome him (posthumously) into the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

Lewis Edward (Eddie) Peay Football • Baseball

On the birth certificate the name reads Louis Edward Peay, but in the Village of Ridgewood everyone knows him by his familiar name "Eddie". Eddie grew up as a young black athlete in the 1950's in Ridgewood, N.J.. He attended the predominantly Afro American Mt Bethel Baptist Church on South Broad Street and attended the Ridgewood Public Schools. While those are some basic facts, the fact is that if you were having a bad day, he was going to change your day around with that signature smile, a big greeting and that powerful handshake that you would never forget.

As Eddie grew up he developed a passion for sports at a very young age. As a young man and only after his chores were done, he would search the local streets in town looking for a pick-up baseball or basketball game or maybe just someone to throw the football with. Eddie went to Union Street Elementary School and then on to George Washington Junior High School. From there it was on to Ridgewood High School where he graduated from in June of 1954. Upon graduating from RHS, Eddie went to Lafayette College in Easton, Pa. to study engineering and play football. Eddie returned home early from college to engage his skills in entrepreneurship and to start a family. He married his high school sweetheart Alveria and had three children Colette, Louis and Jacques. Creating a strong family base with a strong belief in secondary and higher education, all three of his children attended the Ridgewood Public Schools and graduated from Ridgewood High School and from college. Colette and Louis graduated from Ramapo College and Jacques from Bucknell University, where like his father, he played intercollegiate football. Eddie not only started a family, but also a very successful business which was well recognized throughout the Bergen County area as the Peay Moving Service. A well established business in town, it served the community and surrounding area for over sixty years.

From his early youth Eddie was a true athlete as he excelled at baseball and football. In his youth Eddie's Ridgewood Baseball Association's first ever little league all star team was the first village youth team to receive national recognition. His team made it all the way to the regional little league finals in 1949 and lost the final to Hagerstown Md. for a trip to one of the initial little league World Series in Williamsport Pa. This group of young ballplayers were recognized as champions and were looked at as local heroes of the day.


As a high school athlete, Eddie's special skill set showed itself in the fall and spring when he excelled on the gridiron and diamond. In high school Eddie wanted to follow in his older brother Carlos's footsteps, but wanted to cut his own path to success. Being named a first team all county running back in 1953 his record of success and statistics reflect his abilities. He is often talked about in Bergen County football circles as a hard hitting, tough player with outstanding speed and balance. Many comments of the time simply stated it "Was a pleasure to watch him play "Eddie recalls that he truly enjoyed his teammates as he co captained the varsity football team his senior season with Bruce Nealy. He always looked forward to the traditional Thanksgiving Day game with Fairlawn stating "they were always ready for the "Cutter" attack with other players like Bill Dailey and Joe Corcoran". Eddie not only excelled as an athlete, but also as a student enabling him to follow his dream of a football scholarship to Lafayette.


A lifelong Ridgewood resident, Eddie loves the Village and its people. Retired now and still living the dream in Ridgewood, he spends his time spoiling his grandchildren and is always available to share a smile and some good cheer with a "Hey Buddy" and big smile to one and all.





A sound mind in a sound body is the English translation of a famous quotation by the pre-Socratic Greek philosopher Thales (Miletus, 624-546 BC). It is an often used reference in our modern society for one who has achieved high levels of success both athletically and academically. If one was to recognize a prime example of this current definition, one might point to Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame inductee Chris Rae.


Beyond Chris's outstanding athletic credentials, Chris was recognized by the Bergen County YMCAs as one of its top student athletes in 1987. Chris was not only setting records on the tracks around the state, but also showed great academic performance ranked 6th in his class of 445 students at the highly regarded Ridgewood High School. Chris was a National Merit Scholar who went on to attend Stanford University 1987-1992. He earned both Bachelors and Master of Arts degrees in philosophy at Stanford while competing as a member track team that he helped Captain in 1992. Working in the business world for a number of years Chris returned to school 1997-2001 at Duke University where he completed an MBA from the Fuqua School of Business while also completing his Juris Doctorate (JD) from the Duke University Law School.

Athletically Chris was a force on the county, state and national level while a student athlete at RHS. Besides being named to numerous NNJIL All League teams for both winter and spring track seasons, Chris was named to the All Bergen County first team three times for both winter and spring track for the 800 and 1600. In 1986 Chris won the West Point 800m indoor title and the next week won the NJ state Group IV championship. It was only the second time an RHS runner had won an individual Group IV championship. He also set the meet record of 2:20.5 at the NJ Spiked Shoe meet. Chris suffered a stress fracture that impacted his spring season in 1986, but he came back with a vengeance in 1987.

Chris won the 1987 NJ indoor Group IV 800 championship. During the spring season he ran a state best time of 1:51.6 in the 800 setting a school record that would stand for thirteen years. Chris won the NJ State Meet of Champion's title race in a time of 1:52.0. In addition Chris ran a 1200 meter leg of the distance medley at the Penn Relays helping RHS to a coveted fourth place finish. He won the Eastern States mile in a time of 4:13.6. Chris ran in the Golden State meet in Sacramento, Ca. competing in the 800m. The Newark Star Ledger named Chris to their first team All Groups All State team for the spring of 1987 for the 800 m.

At Stanford and running distances during his four year track career for the Cardinal, Chris earned a fifth place in the 1991 Pac Ten Championships in the 1500m with a time of 3:46. Today Chris is a successful businessman in Park City, Utah and can also claim membership to the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame.



If you played a youth sport in Ridgewood, New Jersey in the 1970s or 1980s, there was a good chance that you were coached by the preeminent youth sports coach of that era Mr. Phil Ross Sr. If you were not directly coached by Phil there is a good chance that either you or your parents were sure to have come under his influence in some way.

Phil was raised in Paterson, New Jersey and graduated from Eastside High School where he was the captain of the "ghosts" state championship football team his junior and senior year. He graduated Eastside in 1957 and went on to Rutgers University, where he earned a degree in mathematics. In 1969 Phil brought his family (wife Patricia and children Phil Jr., Kathi and Damian) to settle in Ridgewood.

In 1972 he signed up his son Phil Jr. to play Jr. football and the die was cast. He volunteered his services as a youth coach in the program and from that point on Phil Sr. never looked back. His youth coaching career would last another 25 years. He would go on to coach Jr. football for the next 18 years and be president of the Ridgewood Jr. Football program for ten years. But Coach Ross was just getting started.

You would see him on the sideline of whatever sport his children were involved in wearing his coaches' hat, but then one day his son Phil decided to go out for the school's freshman wrestling team. This was an event that would throw Coach Ross into a new athletic environment that he was not familiar with. He never wrestled mainly because Eastside did not have a wrestling program while he attended there. Coach Ross was certain there must be a youth program in the village, but he found there was no such thing. Since this seemed to be an area of neglect in a very rich community athletic environment, Phil took it upon himself to begin what is now the Ridgewood junior wrestling program. His founding of the program introduced hundreds if not thousands of Ridgewood boys and girls to the sport over the 25 years he served as a coach and president of the organization.

Coach Ross began to study anything he could get his hands on about the sport and recruited his son Phil Jr. and other Ridgewood High School wrestlers to help teach the youth wrestlers in his program. The program grew tremendously through Coach Ross's organizational skills and through his ability to recruit other wrestling alumni and fathers to help through volunteering their time.

Phil's sons went on to be outstanding athletes in football and wrestling in their own right, while his daughter excelled in dance. All three are examples of those values of hard work and perseverance that were so instrumental to Phil's own success in whatever sport or endeavor he was involved with. Phil also served as president of the Ridgewood High School football scholarship committee.

Today, the Phil Ross award is given to the RHS senior wrestler who participated in the Ridgewood Jr. wrestling program as a youth and through their participation in wrestling exemplified the ideals and values that Coach Ross held and demonstrated throughout his life.



RHS 2010 graduate Samantha Cermack is being inducted into the Ridgewood High School Hall of Fame, Class of 2020, for her accomplishments in both soccer and lacrosse.

Girls soccer coach Jeff Yearing cites Sammy's "excellent technical ability, quickness, tenacity, and field vision" as her strengths on the pitch and key factors in her high school career achievement of 67 goals and 40 assists – 6th and 7th respectively all time. A four-year starter from 2006 to 2009, she was named first team all-league all four years, and first team all Bergen county her junior and senior seasons. Her last three seasons she was named to the NJ Girls Soccer Coaches Association 1 team al- state team, and in her senior season, named to that organization's all East team. Coach Yearing comments further on the senior year co-Captain – "a great person, a great athlete, and the definition of a team leader, combined with a tireless work ethic, Sammy was one of our all-time best players."

A 4 year starter for the Girls Lacrosse team from 2007 to 2010, during which the team went 78-11, culminating in her senior year as captain the first Tournament of Champions state title for the Maroons Girls Lacrosse program with the game winning goal for a 7-6 victory over Mendham, Sammy was named by the Newark Star Ledger Girls Lacrosse State Player of the Year. This recognition was complemented by being named North Jersey POY and Bergen County POY. Her career statistics are amongst the leaders in all categories: Career points = 347 (2nd); Career goals = 174 (6th); Career assists = 173 (1st); Career ground balls = 150 (3rd); Career draw controls = 176 (4th); Career interceptions = 25 (4th). Consistent and stellar all four of her high school seasons, she was named 1st team All Suburban all 4 years, 1st team All League and All County her final 3 seasons, 1st team All State her final 2 seasons, and a US Lacrosse All American her junior and senior years.

Sammy continues her lacrosse career today, as the Associate Head Coach for the Lehigh University WLAX program, just completing her 7th season, having joined the staff upon her graduation from Johns Hopkins University. The Lehigh Mountain Hawks have gone 70-40 and have qualified for the Patriot League tournament every year while a member of the coaching staff. While competing for the JHU Blue Jays women's lacrosse team, she achieved continued success, captaining the squad her junior and senior years, and generating 149 career points, 13th highest in team history. She can be found in the Blue Jays record book for career assists = 51 (9th); career ground balls = 101 (17th); career draw controls = 102 (10th) while helping the team to a 43-29 win loss record. In her senior year, she was named 1st team All Region and 3rd team All American. Most significantly, upon the completion of her senior year, Sammy was the recipient of the Blue Jays Unlimited Award, given annually to the Johns Hopkins Varsity Athlete who most exemplifies Spirit and Leadership, Promoting Team Unity and Morale, and enhancing the Athletic Experience of her Teammates.



In June of 2000 Andrew Clarke received Ridgewood High School's most prestigious athletic award for a graduating student athlete "The Dave Vanderbush Award For Athletic Excellence." It is presented each year to a graduating boy and girl who demonstrate outstanding playing ability, sportsmanship on and off the field, leadership and loyalty. The recipients are selected by the entire RHS varsity coaching staff. In Andrew's letter of recognition it was stated by the RHS athletic director Garland Allen that "it is a credit to your determination and high standards that you were selected."

Andrew Clarke was an outstanding three sport athlete for all four years at Ridgewood High School gaining league, county and state recognition in the three sports he participated in football, basketball and lacrosse.


A three year starter for the Maroons varsity football team, he graduated in 2000 holding numerous football records at RHS. Andrew was voted the team's most valuable player for his senior season. Andrew rushed for 2055 career yards which was the most in RHS history at the time. He had 24 career touchdowns(second in RHS history) and was second all time in career tackles with 222. His senior season playing inside linebacker he set the school single season record for tackles with 120. He was voted to the New Jersey super 100 All State Football Team along with first team all county, first team all league and first team all suburban honors. Head coach Chuck Johnson described Andrew in a 1999 interview as "the best and most complete football player I've ever had... There wasn't much he couldn't do on the football field and he was the ultimate leader, an unselfish player who had only the team and winning in mind." Andrew also had an outstanding lacrosse career at RHS. After missing a good portion of his junior year with a back injury, Andrew was selected as a defenseman to the NNJIL first team, the all suburban first team, the Gibb's Division second team and was selected to play in the 2000 North South All Star game. He was also selected to honorable mention all state. Coach Steve Jacobson stated "No one has any idea how good a lacrosse player he could be...He's just a great athlete who jumps right on the lacrosse field with no summer playing time and just goes out and plays hard and aggressive."


As a basketball player for Coach Jim Stroker's varsity squad, Andrew had a prolific career. His senior year he averaged six points and seven rebounds per game. He helped lead the Maroons to an outstanding 20-5 record while being recognized with selection to the All Bergen County first team, first team All NNJIL as well as first team all suburban.


Andrew continued his athletic career at Georgetown University where he played football for the Hoyas. He was a two year starter for Georgetown his junior and senior years, being voted a team co captain his senior season. Georgetown coach Bob Benson called Andrew "an outstanding athlete with strong leadership skills....active all over the field with the ability to find the ball." One of the top linebackers in the patriot league, he lead the league in tackles his senior year with 119 and set the single game Georgetown record for tackles with twenty three vs. Colgate. A member of the patriot league Academic Honor Roll, Andrew was also the recipient of the John L. Hagerty Award from Georgetown for his outstanding play at linebacker. Once described as a "Classy Ridgewood Player" Andrew Clarke more than exemplifies the "Tradition of Excellence" embodied throughout the one hundred and twenty plus years of the athletic program at Ridgewood High School and deservedly is now a member of the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall Of Fame.
















STATE OF ATHLETIC PARTICIPATION IN THE RIDGEWOOD SCHOOLS IN 1915

The article below is a report on the state of athletics and physical training n 1915. This article appeared in the "YEAR BOOK OF THE SCHOOLS from November, 1915. It was published by the Board of Education in Ridgewood, New Jersey to give a report on the state of the Ridgewood Public schools to Date. It recognizes the importance of participation in regular physical activity through a school-based curriculum in physical training and in organized programs of interscholastic athletics. This is the beginning of our tradition of excellence in providing a "sound mind in a sound body" as professed by the Greek Philosopher Thales and the Roman poet Juvenal. Today this same philosophy transcends our nationally recognized programs in health and wellness opportunities for all RHS students as well as one of the finest educationally based interscholastic athletic programs in the state, offering equal opportunities to both our male, female and non-binary student population. A true example of the rich blend of the academic with the physical for a well-balanced wholistic approach to education.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES (High School Colors—Red and White.)

ATHLETICS

Athletics and physical drill is a subject that is receiving greater study than formerly and assuming a place of more importance year by year in the school life of the children.

The vital importance of having a sound physical foundation upon which to build the superstructure of learning is recognized by educators everywhere and today supervised recreation, organized play, physical culture and school athletics find their properly important place in all educational programs. Unlike some other schools in our vicinity, Ridgewood has had no regular physical director or coach provided by the authorities, but has depended on volunteer assistance from teachers acting as faculty advisers in various sports and from outside friends of the schools who have been qualified in different lines of athletics. Due to the high quality of this service and due also in great measure to the school spirit, which has been noticeably improved in the last few years, athletics in the Ridgewood High School are maintained on a high plane. The school is represented in all major sports by teams which make a uniformly creditable record for Ridgewood High. The exceptional record of the football team of 1913 under Captain Earl Hopper, when the complete schedule of 10 games was played through without a single game lost or even a score allowed their opponents, will be long remembered. The unfortunate post-schedule game with Rutherford, where a crippled and stale Ridgewood team was beaten by the best High School team in the State that year, will not detract from the brilliant exploits of Hopper's boys. The remarkable record of the '13 team was due in very large measure to the coaching of our townsman, Mr. Geo. Foster Sanford, affectionately known to followers of the pigskin game as "Sandy."

From twenty to forty boys find pleasure and exercise in the squads of each of the major sports, in addition to which the inter-class games, the recess games and other outdoor activities engage the attention of a large portion of the student body.

The lack of a gymnasium is seriously felt in the school, but the filling and grading of the Athletic Field will give us an admirable stage for outdoor athletics which constitute so potent a factor in the development of that school spirit so much desired and needed in every educational system.

The High School students have a voice in the conducting of their athletics through the Ridgewood High School Athletic Association and the Faculty through the Faculty Advisers in each sport.

RIDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN ATHLETICS

The Ridgewood High School Award for Excellence in Athletics is the highest honor a student athlete can receive from RHS. The athletes listed below were voted as the outstanding athletes of their class for their participation as a student athlete over the entire duration of their high school career.

With the advent of women participating to a greater extent as varsity athletes because of title XI legislation, the first class to recognize a female athlete for this prestigious award was the class of 1974. Research shows that women participated in varsity (major sport) athletics with the creation of the Ridgewood Athletic Association (RAA) in the period of 1913 to 1916 and continued participating in various sports until the 1930's. Female participation in interscholastic athletics can be traced back to the formation of the "Girls Athletic Club" in the 1904-05 school year. There were no male or female athletes recognized during that early period of athletic participation to receive this award.

The awards first recipient, a male, was in 1914, which coincides with the development of the RAA. From that point on the records show a drop off of female participation in varsity athletics starting in the late 1920's and disappearing entirely in the first part of the 1930s. Participation by females in varsity interscholastic athletics began to grow again in the 1970's to the point where it is today, sharing half the athletic participation of the student body.

The origin of the award is found in a 1915 document "Yearbook Of The Schools November 1915" published by the Board of Education Ridgewood, New Jersey. It states "Through the generosity of Mr. Geo Foster Sanford, a cup bearing the Rutgers College seal is annually awarded to that boy of the graduating class who has been distinguished during his high school course because of his excellence in athletics." The 1915 Year Book also gives us the information that Mr. Sanford was a townsperson who served as the coach of the RHS football team at that time and was given credit for training the team to championship caliber performances leading to their renown in the surrounding area and across the state for that period of time. The 1913 team dubbed "The Ridgewood Invincibles" were inducted into the Ridgewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame with the Hall of Fame class of 2014.

The first recipient was Earl B. Hopper in 1914. In 1915 it was Peter Pagano. Somewhere between 1915 and 1926 the Rutgers Cup was renamed The High School Cup for Excellence in Athletics. This is evidenced by a report in the "Year Book Of The Schools The Ridgewood Public Schools" for 1926. In the commencement section (Page 61) under "Prizes and Awards 1926, it shows the names of all of the recipients of "The High School Cup For Excellence In Athletics" to date 1914-1926. The preface to the award recipients' names for 1914-1926 states "The main prize awarded at graduation for athletic supremacy is the High School Athletic Cup presented by the High School Athletic Association to a member of the graduating class. This cup is given for the broadest participation in athletics during the four years" The name of the award evolved over the years to "The Ridgewood High School Award For Excellence in Athletics (eliminating the original concept of a cup given to the recipient). No date is available for that transition, but it is significant that the basis for the award has remained the same over the years. With the retirement of the former athletic director Dave Vanderbush, the award is now named "The Vanderbush Award For Excellence In Athletics" It is noteworthy that the award has been given every year since its inception with female athletes also being recognized with their male counterparts since 1974. There are also multiple winners in both the male and female categories in various years which began in 1981. This was not the case prior to that year.



Interscholastic soccer was approved as a minor sport by the RHSAA in 1922 and elevated to varsity status in the fall of 1927.



SOCCER TEAM

After playing for many years as a minor sport the soccer squad has at last come into its own. Following much discussion and an election by the A. A. committee, soccer has become a major sport. The fine spirit of the squad certainly deserves this reward.

The team played a very average season this year, winning seven games out of fourteen played, losing six and tying one. The first game, played with East Rutherford, resulted in a 0 to 0 score. After this, victory and defeat seemed to come in alternate series. There were three triumphs over Eastern Academy, Barringer, and Hackensack, then two defeats at the hands of Rutherford and Harrison. Next came two more triumphs over the New York Stock Exchange and St. Benedict's, then three more defeats in games with Harrison, Kearny, and East Rutherford. A victory over Rutherford, a defeat from Kearny, and another victory over Hackensack finished up this peculiarly average season.

All of the games were hard fought and on an average the scores very close. The team was managed by Gordon Butler. The captain was Janowitz.

The girls athletic club (GAC) at Ridgewood High School began around 1905. There was no gymnasium available at the Beech Street location, so the girls negotiated gym space at the White Star Athletic Clubhouse. They played their first basketball game on Dec 22, 1906. The team record for 1906-07 was 7-4. In 1907 the team joined the New Jersey Interscholastic League, which also had as members the Hackensack, Englewood, Passaic and Orange High Schools.

The Boys and Girls Athletic Associations at Ridgewood High School joined together in 1913 with a common organization, The Ridgewood Athletic Association (RAA), which promoted the facilitation of interscholastic men's and women's athletics at Ridgewood. Many of the local high schools had women's sports that thrived in highly organized interscholastic leagues until the mid 1930's when most of the women's teams disappeared. It is theorized that, because of the great depression, athletics for women were cut for cost savings and replaced with periodic sport play days to fill the void.

The Boys Athletic Association (BAA) voted to add Football to its roster of athletic teams being sponsored for the first time in the fall of 1908. The team played 3 games that year. All of the games were played against the same competition, the Saginaw AC. The team record was 2 wins and 1 tie. It is recorded that RHS won their first ever football game 2-0, their second 5-0 and tied their third 5-5.

The BAA voted to drop Football for the 1909 season, but brought it back in 1910. By 1913, the football team at Ridgewood was regarded as one of the finest squads in Northern New Jersey and was referred to as the "Ridgewood Invincibles." The team went on to great acclaim that season and gained great recognition again in 1915 when the team went undefeated.

Basketball for Boys and Girls remained the main focus for interscholastic competition during the 1909-10 school year.

On March 19, 1914 it was reported in the Ridgewood Herald that the Ridgewood High School Girls Basketball team defeated Montclair High School at Montclair by the score of 18-17 for their first victory ever versus the "Mounties." Montclair had been the New Jersey state champion for three consecutive years prior to the RHS victory!

The first recorded reference to the RHS colors of "Maroon and White" were made in the winter issue of the 1910 Arrow (published seasonally) when describing the actions of the boy's basketball team as the "Maroon and White." The colors were officially declared in the written constitution of the Ridgewood High School Athletic Association (RAA), which was formed by the student body in 1913. The constitution was written sometime between 1913 and 1916. Article VIII Insignia Sec.1 states, "The colors of the Ridgewood High School are Maroon and White." Section 2 goes on to explain, "The insignia of the Ridgewood High School are the letters R.H.S. maroon and white: the letter R. in white."

Interestingly our tradition of giving a star for second, third, and now fourth year varsity letters was formulated in the original RAA constitution.

Section 4 under Article VIII states, "Only one letter shall be awarded to any student during the course for any one sport. For each additional year in which it services the requirements of the insignia as heretofore stated, shall be awarded a star."

In 1911, a baseball team was formed for the first time since 1906. As stated in the Arrow 1911 spring quarterly, "For the first game the Ridgewood team were faultlessly attired in their new suits which were cut décolleté and up to date in every particular and so becoming! However, this fact did not help them on to victory for they met with a glorious defeat at the hands of the Ridgefield Park High School – which the score of 7-2 will show. This is not discouraging for with the able assistance of their new coach Dr. Whitney, and the enthusiasm the national game always inspires, and the necessary practice they expect to reach satisfactory results in games that are scheduled for the future."

The first track meet was held at RHS June 6, 1913, which became an annual interclass (intramural) competition. There was a call to organize an interscholastic team for 1914. Records show that in the spring of 1914, a banner was won by RHS for defeating Paterson in a dual meet with each school having won a leg of a three meet competition, the next winner would be eligible to keep the banner.

A group of RHS athletes went to the Thirteenth Regimental Armory in Brooklyn on January 5, 1915 to compete for the Eastern Scholastic Championship. Practices were carried out through the winter months, "In order to prepare for this and various other track meets." Further, "This practice will be for everybody because of the coming Interclass Meet and the Badge contest."

The first recorded soccer match at RHS took place October 27, 1918 with the freshman class defeating the sophomore class 2-0. The junior and senior classes also played, but no record of a score has been found. The elementary schools competed in a highly organized interschool soccer league as far back as 1912 according to articles found in the Ridgewood Herald. They were divided into junior and senior levels of competition.

The Ridgewood Herald of December 17, 1914 reported that the Harrison Avenue School won the public school soccer championship at both the senior and junior levels. They were followed in the standings by the combined team (junior and senior level) of Beech Street and Union Street Schools, then Kenilworth School and Monore Street School. The Erie Avenue School did not participate because of low enrollment.

The March 19, 1914 edition of the Ridgewood Herald reported that money for the new soccer ball for the public school league was donated to principal Brooks by a "spirited citizen" who saw the principal on the way to the train station, noting he had heard of the need for a new ball. The citizen wanted to remain anonymous for his kind deed.

After many years playing as minor sport, soccer became a varsity sport in the fall of 1927. The sport was given major sport status after much discussion and an election by the RAA committee. As stated in the 1927 Arrow, "The fine spirit of the squad certainly deserves this reward."


The first cross country meet at RHS was run on November 22, 1918. It was an interclass competition over a two and one half mile course with the finish on the new football field (now located at RHS) before the crowd that had gathered to watch the home gridiron battle with Marist High School.

In 1915, the students of RHS had an intense fund raising campaign to complete the refurbishing of the new athletic field at RHS, which is now the new field turf stadium. They surpassed their goal of raising \$1,600, reaching nearly \$1,700. The fund raising total was kept on a giant board resembling a thermometer in a location that is now Wilsey Square. The athletic field was purchased in 1913 and has been used ever since for Ridgewood High School Athletic contests. The first RHS team to use it was the football team for the 1913 season, even though RHS would not be open to students until May of 1919. It is clear at this time that the athletic field property, currently our high school stadium complex, was purchased as part of the property secured on East Ridgewood Avenue by the Board of Education in 1913 in hopes of constructing a new high school in the not too distant future. The property, not including the Stevens Field site, was purchased from Captain Edwards at a cost of \$30,000.

Prior to the purchase of the athletic field location that is now on the west side of the high school, a large field was often used for athletics which was owned by the Masons and located approximately where the Masonic Temple is now, just off of South Maple Avenue. The Masons also owned a large field space across from the old golf club grounds, now present day Veterans Field, which was also used for sporting events. The old YMCA grounds were often used for athletic contests also.

It was reported in the October 16, 1913 Ridgewood Herald that a group of citizens wanted to organize a group to oversee the organization, supervision, administration of and development of the town's (Ridgewood) inter school sports and games. This is a long ago predecessor of the "Sports Council" that we know of today that represents all of the youth sports activities in the village.


The 1913 group would be known as the "Athletic Advisory Council" and act in the same capacity as the organization in New York City that oversaw the administration of "The Public School Athletic League." According to the records, a motion was made to the Ridgewood Board of Education for approval. It was approved and Dr. Craig would be the lead advisor of a committee that would include community members Frank Kyothe, Rev. Charles O. Wright, Philip L. Shuyler, Charles Woodworth and Mr. Lousing P. Wood, who would represent the local Home and School Association, the Parent Teacher Association and the Alumni of the Ridgewood Public Schools.

1918 FOOTBALL TEAM ON THEIR NEW HOME GROUND






THE RIDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL THAT NEVER WAS!


In March of 1915 it was proposed by the Ridgewood Board of Education to build a new Ridgewood High School on the property acquired by the Board of Education from a Captain Edwards in 1913. The Board had spent \$30,000 in purchasing the land "on the hill" that is now home to RHS bordering on East Ridgewood Avenue. The cost of the new high school structure would be \$225,000 to construct and promised to be a spectacular facility to bring great educational opportunity to all of the children of the village and the surrounding communities. (Ridgewood had students from Glen Rock, Paramus, Midland Park, HoHokus, and beyond). The old high school (the current Ed Center) was becoming highly overcrowded and according to some, unsanitary. Portable classrooms were brought in, (much the same as we have done in the 1970's, 80's and 90's) and many in town argued that this was enough to solve the problem and wished to be spared the expense of having to spend for any new construction. Ridgewood was facing some significant financial burdens at the time.

Another faction argued that the Edwards property was unsultable and pushed to have a vote on the acquisition of a new site called the "DeMund-Mastin option." That option would have put Ridgewood High School closer to the center of town with the high school property being bordered on the North by East Ridgewood Avenue, the South by Dayton Street and the West by Oak Street. To the East were the lands of David D. Zabriskie and the estate of John McCroden, putting the high school essentially on the site that once was the acreage that made up the old Archibald-Vroom farmstead. The asking price was \$62,000. In an editorial that appeared in the Ridgewood Herald dated November 18, 1915, EB Lilly, arguing in favor for the Edwards site, stated, "It has more over in the contiguity of a fine athletic field, one of the most potent factors in fostering that school spirit which is so important to the development of any high school or college." Debate raged for months when finally a committee of town leaders and the women of the community brought the issue to a head in January of 1916. In one of the largest turn outs for a vote in the town's history to that point, the proposal to purchase the DeMund-Mastin tract was defeated by a total of over 1,100 against to 70 for. The Edwards's property purchased in 1913 was declared the site that the new high school would be built on.

In a vote that followed a few weeks later, the plan to build a new high school passed by nearly a 4 to 1 ratio. A new architectural firm was chosen from over forty submissions. The firm of Tracey L. Swartwout of New York was awarded the job. The firm had recently designed the plans for the new state capitol building in Missouri. An amount equal to the original proposal to build the high school, \$225,000, was approved for the project by the Board of Education and the building we now know with its classic lines, tower, and large cupola was born. Classes began to occupy the new building in May of 1919.

History of the Robb Football Trophy

'The epitome of all good virtues'

As football season at Ridgewood High School gets under way, take a moment to read about an RHS football star from 73 years ago whose name comes back year after year.

A few of Ridgewood's 113 Honored Dead have been memorialized by friends and family so that even to this day we recognize their gifts and their sacrifice. One such memorial was created in the name of Richard Robb and is valued to

Sometimes known as Roscoe, Robb lived at 12 E. Ridgewood Ave. and 334 Prospect St. His only brother died in 1934. He attended elementary school in Ridgewood, was a Boy Scout and was active in the High School League at West Side Presbyterian Church. He also worked an afternoon job at a local Texaco Station.

Before graduating from RHS in 1941 he was in the Willow Club, played the trumpet in the swing band, acted in the junior play and was on the music committee for the senior prom.

A lineman on the football team, his football coach later said, "Richie was the epitome of all good virtues. He was an aggressive football player who ran like a deer."

Roscoe went to Virginia Tech and later to Lafayette College to study engineering. While there, he was a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity. He joined the service and received his aerial gunner's wings at Ellington

Field in Laredo, Texas in October 1943 and his commission at

the Bombardier Quadrangle School in Childress, Texas on 50-caliber machine guns. Feb. 26, 1944.

He was then assigned to Barksdale Field in Shreveport, La. Two months later, on April 15, 1944, he married June Gorham, his RHS classmate, in the Post Chapel at Barksdale Field. Three months later. he was best man at the marriage of another eventual Ridgewood casualty, Ronnie Helps.

As a member of the 584th Bomber Squadron, 394th Bomb Group Medium (9th AAF), he moved overseas in late August 1944. Flying the B-26 "Marauder" and the Douglas A-26 "Invader," the 394th hit strong points at Brest and then began to operate against targets in Ger-many. Robb's "Marauder" was powered by two 2,000HP engines, manned by a crew of six, carried a bomb load of up to 5,200 pounds and was customarily armed with 10 30- and

Air Commands of the 9th AF, with support from the British 2nd Tactical AF. More than 300 B-26s and A-20s, with fighter

escort, hit strong points and bridges over wide areas of Eastern France and Western

Robb was engaged in low level bombing of railroad bridges and yards in the Rhine River Valley on their 138th mission. Flying out of Cambrai/Niergnies, France, Robb was killed Sunday, Oct. 8, 1944, when his B-26 col-

lided with another plane while landing upon return from a mission against the railroad bridge a Ahrweiler.

In 1983, his friends created th Robb Football Trophy at RHS, which is still presented to the outstanding varsity lineman upo the player's graduation in June. Roscoe is buried in Plot B, Row 20, Grave 71 at Epinal American Cemetery, Epinal, France.

At death, he was 21 years old.

Given very little chance at the outset of the 1940 season, the R.H.S. football team proved its mettle by becoming one of the best to represent the Maroon in recent years. Teamwork and good spirit marked its efforts in all games and lack of weight was more than overcome by its speed and aggressiveness.

Led by Co-captains Bill Moore, tackle, and Pete Brown, back, the Maroon went through six straight before suffering its first set-back. Leonia was defeated 13-7 in the opener in a game which showed the versatility of the veteran "pony" backfield. The fol-lowing week, Hackensack was defeated for the first time since 1936 by the score of 13-0. In the third game, Ridgewood was forced to come from behind in the last five minutes in order to tiet Lodi 6-6. The Marcon continued its unbeaten way in its fourth encounter with Hawthorne 18-0 but was again forced to come from behind in its game with Lyndhurst, which finally ended 6-6. On Election Day, Passaic Valley, a new opponent, was soundly trounced 39-0. Pompton Lakes brought the undefeated string to an end by decisively trimming the Maroon 27-7,

but some prestige was retained as this was the first touchdown ever scored by Ridgewood against Pompton. Ridgewood continued its slump against Clifford Scott and lost 31-13. Some consolation may be had over these defeats since both teams which defeated Ridgewood were later awarded State Championships. The annual Thanksgiving Day game ended the season successfully as Westfield was defeated 18.0


Pete Brown, Frank Bradley, Don Mc-Cullough and Bob Crandall composed Ridgewood's pony backfield with Frank handling the bulk of the passing attack which was a big factor in the success of the team. On the line, Bill Moore, Dick Simpson, and Stan Frank were stand-outs. Dick Casey, Paul Cook, Don Coyle, Rex Gearon, George Henry, Roger Probert and Richie Robb were other Senior letter winners.

With six letter-men from the Junior Class, two from the Sophomore Class and several promising prospects from among the numeral winners as a nucleus for the team next fall, it is hoped that R.H.S. will carry on from where it left off last November.






RHS Football Team, 1925-1926



RHS Track Team, 1925-1926




RHS Baseball Team, 1925-26

Women received the right to vote two years earlier when the 19th Amendment to the constitution was ratified August 18, 1920 guaranteeing a women's right to vote! Fifty years later, in 1972, Title IX legislation was passed, which allowed female athletics to expand protecting the rights of people from discrimination based on gender in educational institutions, programs or activities that receive federal financial assistance.

These two, with the other sports already open to the boys, make six different branches of athletics in which the boys of R. H. S. may earn school letters. That is all well and good, but what about the girls? Three years ago the Girls' Basketball Team was organized. Last year and this year the girls have had a hard time to persuade the authorities to let them have the team continued. Too much time spent on athletics would affect the studies, but if each girl had to have a fair report of her studies every so often or be dropped from her particular squad until her marks are better, there would be no need for complaint on that score.

But the most important thing which interscholastic athletics teaches so much better than inter-class is sportmanship. When you are having a game with your friends as opponents, for that is all an inter-class game is, you might think that, if you should gently but firmly push that opponent of yours out of the way without the referee's being able to see you, she wouldn't mind very much as you are a friend of hers. But when you have been shoved around by a girl you don't know, you appreciate the feeling which some girl has when you treat her that way, and you like the sound of that golden rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you". Or if you chance to play against a girl who is playing just as fairly as she can and saving you all But the most important thing which interscholastic athletics













RIDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL 1922 ATHLETICS OVERVIEW AND FOOTBALL

Until the early 1930's the Ridgewood High School yearbook The Arrow was published in four segments. The edition published in the Fall usually had as one of its main themes the state of the athletics programs at RHS. In this issue from ninety four years ago, November 1922, we can see the development of some of the athletic programs Ridgewood still has today as well as some that we don't. Girls (Field) Hockey is mentioned and was sponsored off and on throughout the 1920s. RHS dropped Girls Field Hockey after the 1982 season with the introduction of Girls Soccer into the athletic program in 1983. We find that Ridgewood did sponsor girls basketball the winter of 1922-23 in organized fashion and played in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic league with the 1922-23 edition of the team, mentioned in this quarterly, going on to win the first ever girls interscholastic championship at the school. That team was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2008. We also see that Boys Soccer was introduced at the interscholastic level as a minor sport for the first time and would gain status as a major varsity sport for the 1927 season. Boys Cross Country is introduced for the first time in 1922 as well as the idea of Freshman Football. A history of Ridgewood Football is given in this quarterly and it might be mentioned that the account of the 1913 team gives reason as to why that team was inducted into the RHS Athletic Hall of Fame in 2014 as one of the first great interscholastic teams representing the school and setting a standard for what we call our "Tradition of Excellence "today.

Find out what it is. Try something. The time spent on the athletic field is well worth it. You will be amply repaid.



RIDGEWOOD FOOTBALL, PAST AND PRESENT

Sportsmanship is an attitude of mind which seeks to find expression in certain qualities. It is very readily applied to athletics and school activities or life. One sees the most emphatic illustration of this spirit in athletics. Here one learns to fight for victory in a fair and square way. Men who have the requisites, virylgor, and stamina, have no better field to test them in than football.

From the time of the founding of our Athletic Association in

From the time of the founding of our Athletic Association in Ridgewood High School, football has rapidly grown in favor in Ridgewood until today it is one of our major sports, well supported and well played. From the good old days when football was first played here up to this present season we have had pretty much the same opponents, and a summary of clashes with these teams shows that Ridgewood is to the fore in most cases.

In the days of 1913 in Ridgewood we have a fine example of past football. The high school started practice in September with eighteen men, and no coach but the captain. Captain Donnelly developed his team of that year into a fast, hard, clean-playing bunch. In that year we had such men as Hopper, conspicious on account of his line plunging and punting, Pagano to rake in the forward passes, and Todd with his fine defensive work. This same Hopper, who played for Ridgewood, later achieved fame on the gridiron as captain of Pennsylvania. The standard which this group of stars helped to set established a precedent which Ridge-

The standard which this group of stars helped to set established a precedent which Ridgewood has always tried to live up to. That year, pitted against some of the strongest teams, Ridgewood High School scored 246 points to its opponents 68. Many a severe jolt was given to the aspirations of other schools by our warriors of that day.

Each succeeding year has been nearly as successful for the Red and White. In recognition of the efforts of our men an order was established about 1914 by the football team that was known as the Order of the "R". The requirements to be a wearer of the sacred "R" were very strict as compared to those of today. A player had to play in 50 per cent. of the games, not less than 4. Today it is 25 per cent. of the numbers of games played.

In former years these teams which so successfully carried the high school to victory had no such incentive as regularly organized cheering. Modes of travel to and from games and equipment also were below the par of those of today. But in spite of these handicaps the records of those former teams prove that it is largely hard work and not equipment that brings forth a winning team and season. ning team and season.

A few years later we have men whose names are more famil-A few years later we have men whose names are more familiar to us. In 1917-18, people were dubious as to the outcome of our football team because of the loss of such stars as Runk, M. Hopper, and others. The pessimists lost out, however. Other men stepped up to brighten the fame of our school. Caramella, Beatty, T. White, Troup, and Ford all came to the fore in the next couple of years. At this time our present coach, Judson Ford, played a very modest but hard game at guard.

A personage by the name of Mr. Tack L. Dummie made his first appearance in Ridgewood and according to an article by Mr. Ford, in a previous issue of the Arrow, his influence was considerably felt in the high school.

siderably felt in the high school.

In 1917-18 a very successful year was experienced as the following score would indicate: R. H. S. 47—Cliffside 0; R. H. S. 38—Passale 0; R. H. S. 27—Rutherford 0. Other games just as profitable for us followed. In 1918 and 1919 a new group of stars loomed up to carry on the good work. The backfield was one worthy of recognition, consisting of Joe Batchelor, H. B.; Gwynn Fielding, H. B.; Dave Shannon, Q. B.; and Duncan Cheel, F. B. The spirit of the school took a big jump up the ladder this year. Mellie Hiler first won fame at this time which earned him the position of all state center in 1921. the position of all state center in 1921.

During this year many spectacular games were played. One battle of the season brought out the same "do or die" spirit as shown by Ridgewood teams in former years. In this game Bill Drier was "knocked out" six times but each time "came back", typically illustrating the fighting spirit of the team. Gwynn Fielding was also "knocked out" for the first time in his career as a feetball player. football player.

A game with Paterson High School about this time showed what our "crew of huskies" really could do. The score was 38—0. This score was piled up against one of the best teams Paterson had turned out in several seasons. Last year we again met Paterson after a respite, and this game, replete with thrills, kept the audience continually on edge. The score was 7—0. About this time Rutherford, champions for three years and would-be champions of the time, clashed with Ridgewood on the gridiron in a game which will long be remembered. Four touchdowns to one shows what perseverance and hard playing did for us. This indomitable fighting spirit of past, present and future is one of Ridgewood's greatest assets on the football field.

As in the colleges, football in the high schools has made rapid

As in the colleges, football in the high schools has made rapid advancement. The teams of football in Ridgewood today will rank as the standard set by other schools, our rivals Passaic, Rutherford, Englewood and Hackensack. True it is that a team cannot always be champions but we try to follow up the example and record before us as set by previous Ridgewood teams. The eleven we have today and the outlook for next year and ensuing years is good. One of the main reasons for this belief is the fact that we are fairly sure of having a permanent coach, Mr. Ford. In the past the coach has been with us for one season at a time and then again not at all. This is a handicap to any school.

In this way the rudiments of the game are learned by those who have four years in which to attain a coveted position on the varsity. Experience is a good teacher. This idea follows somewhat along that of the one at Rutherford. This school generally turns out a team of championship material. They, however, start in the grammar school to learn the game, a very good idea.

Fighting rallies in second half showing offensive strength is a noticeable factor in this year's games. Football so far this year has been fair to middling—nothing more. No special or dazzling advances seem to have been made. Let us note a few details of our games as played this year. Punting by Captain Wadsworth is good and well adapted for covering. Passing, also by Wadsworth is fine, accurate and swift. The offense seems to be fair but it does not seem to work together. The defense seems good when it comes to a pinch. With Cliff-side and then once again this year the team has demonstrated this by standing like a stone wall with the ball on their own 5 yard line or thereabout. These facts when summed up compare fairly well with facts of the same nature from previous years. Next year a number of the good men will be back and start us off on one of our best schedules.

Thus in speaking of football both past and present in Ridgewood one might say that it has embodied the true spirit of Ridgewood High School; that it has always brought forth the truer, finer, qualities of school spirit that only clean fair play can produce. And because football has done so much to advance and uphold the traditions of the school it is to be hoped that it will always be a dominating sport in the future. Much has been said about the football player but the following lines seem to describe him perfectly:

> He's just one man of the eleven, A cog, or a link in the chain; The best type of man under heaven, A user of muscle and brain.

For ev'ry wrong move he is scolded; He knows he must play hard and clean; Sometimes for his good work they praise him, And sometimes he does it unseen.




Ridgewood went 26-11-3 (.703) and outscored Fair Lawn 1,152 - 703 (1944-1983) Coaches TDay 1944-83: Mozeleski 9-5-1, Sweeney 12-4-1, Vanderbush 2-1-1, Reamer 3-1 Longest winning streak: Ridgewood 8 games 1970-77 Coaches longest winning streak 6. Fair Lawn High School opened September 13, 1943 and played an independent schedule in 1943 and 1944. That first Thanksgiving Day saw the CUTTERS bite the TERRIERS of Holy Trinity High of Westfield 19-0 before beginning the rivalry against Ridgewood in 1944.

Fair Lawn joined the Bergen-Passaic Interscholastic League (B-PIL) in 1945. Ridgewood joined in 1950. The league became the Northern Bergen Interscholastic League (NBIL) in 1956 when Hawthorne, the only Passaic County school, left. Fair Lawn and Ridgewood moved up to the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League (NNJIL) in 1959. Fair Lawn returned to the NBIL in 1984 ending the 40-year rivalry.

Fair Lawn was B-PIL champion in 1945, co-champion with Bogota in 1946, co-Champion with Lyndhurst in 1947 and champion in 1953 and 1955. Ridgewood won the B-PIL in 1950 and 1951 while taking three NBIL championships in a row in 1956,1957 and 1958. The 1956 and 1957 seasons were back to back undefeated campaigns for Frank Mozeleski's Maroons.



In the 1950s the Turkey Day Classic often determined the NBIL championship.

In 1959, Fair Lawn upset Hackensack 27-6 and lost 6-0 to Tenafly in a hurricane. It was the only game played in New Jersey that day. Going into the Thanksgiving game Fair Lawn had one loss and Hackensack had the loss to Fair Lawn and a tie against Ridgewood. The upset 13-7 Ridgewood victory gave Hackensack the NNJIL championship by half a game despite being beaten by Fair Lawn and tied by Ridgewood, the two new kids on the block!

Fair Lawn won the NNJIL championship in 1965 and 1966 and was tri-champion with Clifton and Passaic Valley in 1980. Ridgewood won NNJIL championships in in 1960 and 1972 under head coach Roger Sweeney.

Going into the 1966 Thanksgiving game, Fair Lawn was 8-0 (1.000) and had a 24 game non-losing streak going including ties against Ridgewood in 1964 and Hackensack in 1965.



The shocking 40-34 Ridgewood upset by an upstart (2-6) Ridgewood team before a crowd of 13,000 at what later became SASSO FIELD ended the streak giving the MAROONS what many consider to be the greatest victory in the 44 year history of the rivalry. But, Fair Lawn still took the NNJIL title. NBIL Division 1 titles followed in 1984, '85, '87 and '89.

In 2012 the rivalry was renewed in Big North Conference (BNC) crossover action, but not on Thanksgiving. Ridgewood took all four games in the revival of the rivalry under head coach Chuck Johnson.





Fair Lawn 24-Game String Ends As Ridgewood Triumphs, 40-33

FAIR LAWN, N. J., Nov. 24 -Bruce Jankowski, the leading scorer in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League, scored three touchdowns today but it wasn't enough to prevent Ridgewood from recording a 40-33 upset victory over Fair Lawn. The loss was the first for the previously undefeated Cutters, who had not been beaten in 24 games over a threevear veriod.

Cutr Hendry completed eight of 15 passes for 244 yards and four touchdowns. The Maroon quarterback passed to George Lewis for a pair of last-period touchdowns on plays of 83 and 60 yards.

Jankowski scored on runs of 75 and 30 yards and on a 32-yard pass from Don Kober to run his season scoring total to 160 points. He also passed for a touchdown.


Ridgewood Junior Wrestling (RJW)
